THAT, pursuant to the provisions of Article 50 of the Treaty for the Establishment of the East African Community and Rule 13(5) of the East African Legislative Assembly Elections (Election of Members of the Assembly) Rules, 2017, and notwithstanding the provisions of Standing Order 47(1), this

House adopts the Report of the Joint Parliamentary Select Committee on its consideration of the nominees for election as Members of the East African Legislative Assembly, laid on the Table of the House today, Thursday, December 7, 2017, and further resolves that the election be held on Thursday, December 14, 2017.

10*. <u>MOTION-</u> <u>REGULATIONS REGARDING LICENSING OF NEW</u> <u>SUGAR FACTORIES</u>

(The Hon. Walter Owino, M.P.)

THAT, aware that sugar cane production in the country has declined significantly in the past few years due to the numerous problems facing the sector including high cost of sugar production, cane poaching, low productivity and heavy indebtness of the publicly owned sugar milling plants, imprudent business decisions, and corruption; concerned that the drop in the sugarcane production has resulted in shortage as well as high cost of sugar in the country; noting that traditionally, the Kenyan cane growing model has operated on an out-growers model whereby farmers are supported to grow cane on their farms and in turn, they are expected to supply the cane to the millers who facilitated cane development; concerned that that the genesis of cane poaching is attributable to weak and non-adherence of regulations regarding licensing of new factories and failure to honour contractual agreements by both the millers and farmers; this House urges the Government through the State Department of Agriculture and the Kenya Sugar Board to consider writing off debts owed by the publicly owed by sugar companies; reintroduce the sugar development fund; revive out growers companies; review regulations regarding licensing of new sugar factories to ensure supply contracts are provided as proof of availability and adequacy of sugarcane supply, and are adhered to as a precondition for licensing of cane millers; and ensure that contractual agreements by both millers and farmers are honoured.

11*. <u>MOTION</u> – <u>PROVISION OF SALARY INCENTIVES AND</u> <u>ADEQUATE DECENT HOUSING FOR POLICE</u> <u>OFFICERS WHO ARE DEPLOYED TO SERVE IN</u> <u>NORTHERN KENYA AND OTHER HARDSHIP AREAS</u> (The Hon. Omar Mohamed Maalim, M.P.)

THAT, acknowledging that the Kenya Police play a very important role in providing assistance to the public when in need, maintenance of law and order, preservation of peace, protection of life and property, investigation of crimes, collection of criminal intelligence, prevention and detection of crime, apprehension of offenders, enforcement of laws and regulations with which it is charged among other roles as provided for under Section 24 of the National Police Service Act; concerned that many police officers across the Country/11*(cont'd)

especially those working in Northern Kenya and other high risk and hardship areas continue to work under a very difficult environment characterized by among others, inadequate and inhabitable, deplorable and congested living quarters, insufficient tools for work and poor salaries and allowances; further concerned that the difficult working environment for the police officers has often led to frustrations, demotivation and occupational stress among officers with many of them exiting the force in search of other jobs; this House <u>urges</u> the National Police Service Commission and the Salaries and Remuneration Commission to provide salary incentives and adequate decent housing for Police Officers who are deployed to serve in Northern Kenya and other hardship areas.

12*. <u>MOTION</u> - <u>DESIGNATION AND GAZETTEMENT OF AREAS AND</u> <u>STREETS FOR DEMONSTRATIONS AND PICKETING</u> (The Hon. Simon N. King'ara, M.P.)

THAT, aware that Article 37 of the Constitution guarantees every person the right, peaceably and unarmed, to assemble, to demonstrate, to picket, and to present petitions to public authorities; noting that there is need to guarantee that the enjoyment of rights and fundamental freedoms by any individual should not prejudice the rights and fundamental freedoms of others; noting that demonstrations and picketing in cities and major towns in the Country, particularly in Nairobi, Mombasa and Kisumu have on many occasions resulted in destructions, loss of lives and property, public disorder, and creation of an unfavourable business environment; noting that the rights and freedoms are *not* unconditional because the government has a duty and responsibility to ensure maintenance of peace and public order, and protection of the rights, life and property of all its citizens; this House resolves that the Government should designate and *gazette* specific areas and streets for demonstrations and picketing with a view to ensuring that individuals enjoy their rights and freedoms as enshrined in the Constitution without infringing on the freedoms and rights of others.
