FOREWORD

Pursuant to Article 152 (2) of the Constitution and section 5 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, No. 33 of 2011, His Excellency the President nominated Hon. Mutahi Kagwe, EGH for appointment to the position of Cabinet Secretary for Health. His Excellency the President also nominated Ms. Betty Chemutai Maina, CBS for appointment to the position of Cabinet Secretary for Industrialization, Trade & Enterprise Development. Their nomination was conveyed to the Speaker of the National Assembly through a letter Ref. No. OP/CAB.1/40A, dated 15th January, 2020 (Annexure 1). The nominees' Curricula Vitae and Testimonials were enclosed in the letter.

On Monday, 10th February, 2020 and pursuant to Standing Order 42(1), the Speaker of the National Assembly read the Message from His Excellency the President communicating the names of the nominees to the House for the position of Cabinet Secretary for Health; and Cabinet Secretary for Industrialization, Trade & Enterprise Development, respectively. Pursuant to section 4 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011 and Standing Order 204(4), the names of the nominees were referred to the Committee on Appointments for vetting and reporting to the House within fourteen (14) days.

In compliance with section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, the Clerk of the National Assembly placed an advertisement in the print media on Friday, 14th February, 2020, (Annexure 2) inviting the public to submit memoranda by way of written statements on oath (affidavit) on the suitability or otherwise of the nominee in conformity with section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011. The advertisement indicated that the submissions were to be received by Wednesday, 19th February, 2020 at 5.00 pm. By close of the submission deadline, the Committee had not received any submission for or against the suitability of the nominees for appointment as Cabinet Secretaries.

Further, in fulfilment of the provisions of Article 118 of the Constitution, section 6(4) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011 and Standing Order 45(3), the Clerk of the National Assembly on Friday, 14th February, 2020, notified the public in the print media of the intention of the Committee on Appointments to conduct the approval hearing of the nominees on Thursday, 20th February, 2020 from 10.00 am (Annexure 3).

The nominees appeared before the Committee on Thursday, 20th February, 2020 for approval hearing in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011 and the National Assembly Standing Orders on their

suitability or otherwise for appointment to the position of Cabinet Secretary for Health; and Cabinet Secretary for Industrialization, Trade & Enterprise Development respectively.

Having conducted the approval hearing for the nominees pursuant to Article 152(2) of the Constitution, sections 3 and 5 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011 and Standing Order 204 (4), the Committee recommends that this House approves the nomination of Hon. Mutahi Kagwe, EGH for appointment as Cabinet Secretary for Health and Ms. Betty Chemutai Maina, CBS for appointment as Cabinet Secretary for Industrialization, Trade and Enterprise Development.

May I take this opportunity to thank all the Members of the Committee for their input and valuable contributions and time during the approval hearings and deliberations during the writing of the report. The Committee also takes this opportunity to thank the Offices of the Speaker and of the Clerk of the National Assembly for the technical support accorded to it during the exercise.

1. PREFACE

1.1. Establishment and Mandate of the Committee

 The Committee on Appointments is established under Standing Order 204(1). Standing Order 204(4) provides that the Committee on Appointments shall consider, for approval by the House, appointments under Article 152(2) of the Constitution (Cabinet Secretaries).

1.1 Members of the Committee

2. The Committee on Appointments was constituted by the House on Thursday, 14th December, 2017 and comprises of the following Members:

2. BACKGROUND

2.1. Notification of Nominations

4. Pursuant to Article 152(2) of the Constitution, His Excellency the President, through the Head of Public Service forwarded to the Clerk of the National Assembly, the names of the two (2) Cabinet Secretary nominees vide a letter dated 15th January, 2020 and reference number OP/CAB.1/40A (Annexure 1), for vetting by the Committee on Appointments and consideration for approval by the National Assembly for appointment as Cabinet Secretaries. The notification of nominations contained the curricula vitae and testimonials of Hon. Mutahi Kagwe, EGH, Cabinet Secretary nominee for Health and Ms. Betty Chemutai Maina, CBS Cabinet Secretary nominee for Industrialization, Trade and Enterprise Development.

2.2. Communication of the Nominations and Committal to the Committee on Appointments

- 5. The Committee on Appointments conducts approval hearings for Cabinet Secretaries as provided under Article 152 (2) of the Constitution and Standing Order 204 (4).
- 6. Noting that the notification of the nomination of Hon. Mutahi Kagwe, EGH and Ms. Betty Chemutai Maina, CBS as Cabinet Secretaries was received on 23rd January 2020, a time when the House was on recess, the Speaker of the National Assembly pursuant to provisions of Standing Order 42(2), caused the Message to be transmitted to every Member of the National Assembly on 24th January, 2020.
- 7. Pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 42(1), the Speaker on Monday, February 10, 2020, in a Communication informed the House of the notification for nomination of Hon. Mutahi Kagwe, EGH nominee for the position of Cabinet Secretary for Health and Ms. Betty Chemutai Maina, CBS nominee for the position of Cabinet Secretary for Industrialization, Trade and Enterprise Development by H. E. the President.
- 8. Pursuant to section 4 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011 and Standing Order 204, the names and curricula vitae of the nominees were committed to the Committee on Appointments for approval hearings and reporting to the House within fourteen (14) days.

2.3. Notification to the Public

- 9. Section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011 provides that "any person may, prior to the approval hearing and by written statement on oath, provide the Clerk with evidence contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold the office to which the candidate has been nominated".
- 10. The Clerk of the National Assembly placed an advertisement in the print media on Friday, 14th February, 2020 (Annexure 2) inviting the public to submit memoranda by way of a written statement on oath (affidavit) on the suitability or otherwise of the nominee in conformity with section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011. The

- advertisement indicated that the submissions were to be received by Tuesday 18th February, 2020 at 5.00 pm.
- 11. Further, pursuant to the provisions of Article 118 of the Constitution, section 6(4) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011 and Standing Order 45(3), the general public was on Friday, 14th February, 2020 notified in the print media by the Clerk of the National Assembly of the intention of the Committee on Appointments to conduct the approval hearing of the nominees on Thursday, 20th February, 2020 from 10.00 am (Annexure 3).

2.4. Notification to the Nominees

12. On Wednesday, 12th February, 2020, pursuant to sections 4 and 6(3) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, the Clerk in writing invited the nominees for the approval hearing indicating the time and place of the vetting. (Annexure 4).

2.5. Clearance and Compliance Requirements

- 13. On Wednesday, 12th February, 2020, the Clerk of the National Assembly wrote to the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC), Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI), the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB) and the Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP) (Annexure 5) requesting for reports with respect to the nominees on the following matters:
 - (a) ethics and integrity;
 - (b) tax compliance;
 - (c) criminal records;
 - (d) Higher education loan repayments; and
 - (e) political party affiliations.
- 14. On matters of ethics and integrity, the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC) vide a letter Ref. No. EACC.7/10/5 VOL.XII (182) dated 19th February, 2020, (Annexure 6) confirmed that the Commission had not undertaken any investigations where the nominees have been adversely mentioned or found culpable.
- 15. With regard to tax compliance, the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA) confirmed vide a letter Ref. No. KRA/5/1002/26/ (1085) and dated 19th February, 2020, (Annexure 7) that Hon. Mutahi Kagwe, EGH (PIN No. A000149700F) and Ms. Betty Chemutai Maina, CBS (PIN No A002659381M) were tax compliant.
- 16. The Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI) through a letter Ref. No. DCI/CRO/SEC/6/7/2/A/VOL.VIII/172 dated 13th February, 2020 (*Annexure 8a*) confirmed that the nominees, Hon. Mutahi Kagwe, EGH and Ms. Betty Chemutai Maina, CBS were genuinely issued with the clearance certificates annexed hereto and dated 22nd January, 2020 and 10th February 2020 respectively. (Annexure 8b).

- 17. Responding to the request, the Higher Education Loans Board (HELB) confirmed vide a letter Ref. No. HELB/RR/112009/30 dated 17th February, 2020 (Annexure 10), that the nominees were not beneficiaries of the HELB Loans Scheme.
- **18.** On the issue of party affiliation, the Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP), vide Ref. No. RPP/ORG/34 Vol. III (4) dated 13th February, 2020 (*Annexure 9*) indicated that the nominees were not officials of any political party.

2.6. Issues for Consideration during the Approval Hearing

- 19. The Committee took into consideration section 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011 which provides the issues for consideration by the relevant House in relation to any nomination. These are:
 - (a) the procedure used to arrive at the nominee;
 - (b) any constitutional or statutory requirements relating to the office in question; and
 - (c) the suitability of the nominee for appointment proposed having regard to whether the nominee's abilities, experience and qualities meet the needs of the body to which nomination is being made.
- 20. Further, the Committee considered section 6 (7) of the Act which places focus on a candidate's academic credentials, professional training and experience, personal integrity and background.

(a) Procedure for Nomination

21. The procedure for appointment of a Cabinet Secretary is outlined under the Constitution. A close reading of Articles 132 (2) and 152(2) of the Constitution reveals that nomination of Cabinet Secretaries is a constitutional prerogative of the President as there is no further procedure prescribed in the Constitution or statute law.

(b) Constitutional and Statutory Requirements

22. The Constitution in addition gives guidelines on how to appoint persons to public office which include -

(i) Two-Third Gender Rule

23. Article 27 (8) of the Constitution provides that the State shall take legislative and other measures to implement the principle that not more than two-thirds of the members of elective or appointive bodies shall be of the same gender. If the nominees are approved, the Cabinet will comprise of seven (7) women and fourteen (14) men thus in compliance with the two thirds gender requirement.

(ii) Representation of Regional and Ethnic Diversity

24. Article 130 (2) of the Constitution provides that the composition of the national executive shall reflect the regional and ethnic diversity of the people of Kenya. It is worth noting that Article 152 (1) (d) of the Constitution limits the number of Cabinet Secretaries to twenty-two. The

Committee however noted that there is a lacuna in the law on the definition of a region and that this needed to be clearly provided for.

(iii) Leadership and Integrity

- 25. The Committee, in determining the suitability of the nominees, was also guided by the provisions on leadership and integrity as outlined under Chapter Six of the Constitution. In particular, Article 73 (2) provides that the guiding principles of leadership and integrity include
 - (a) selection on the basis of personal integrity, competence and suitability, or election in free and fair elections;
 - (b) objectivity and impartiality in decision making, and in ensuring that decisions are not influenced by nepotism, favouritism, other improper motives or corrupt practices;
 - (c) selfless service based solely on the public interest, demonstrated by -
 - (i) honesty in the execution of public duties; and
 - (ii) the declaration of any personal interest that may conflict with public duties;
 - (d) accountability to the public for decisions and actions; and
 - (e) discipline and commitment in service to the people.
- 26. Article 77(5) requires a State Officer, whether in public or private life to behave in a manner that avoids conflict between personal interest and public official duties. This Article further prohibits a State Officer who has been removed from office under it from holding any other State Office.
- 27. Article 77(1) prohibits a full time State Officer from participating in any other gainful employment.
- 28. Article 77(2) prohibits an appointed State officer from holding office in a political party. Article 78 disqualifies persons who are not Kenyan Citizens from appointment as State Officers. Further, a State Officer is barred from holding dual citizenship.
- 29. In addition, the Committee considered section 10 of the Leadership and Integrity Act, 2012 in particular which provides that
 - A State officer shall, to the best of their ability—
 - (a) carry out the duties of the office efficiently and honestly;
 - (b) carry out the duties in a transparent and accountable manner;
 - (c) keep accurate records and documents relating to the functions of the office; and
 - (d) report truthfully on all matters of the organization which they represent.

- c) Suitability of the nominees for the proposed appointment having regard to whether the nominees' abilities, experience and qualities meet the needs of the body to which the nomination is being made
- 30. The suitability of the nominees was assessed after scrutiny of the nominees' credentials, experience, background and qualities as well as their performance during the approval hearings.

2.7. Memoranda from Members of the Public in respect of the Nominees

- 31. Pursuant to section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011 which provides that "any person may, prior to the approval hearing, and by written statement on oath, provide the Clerk with evidence contesting the suitability of a candidate to hold office to which the candidate has been nominated", the Clerk of the National Assembly placed an advertisement in the print media on Friday, 14th February, 2020 (Annexure 2) inviting the public to submit memoranda by way of written statements on oath (affidavit) on the suitability or otherwise of the nominees in conformity with section 6(9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011.
- 32. By close of business on Tuesday, 18th February, 2020 at 5.00 pm the Committee had not received any submissions against the nomination for appointment of Hon. Mutahi Kagwe, EGH as Cabinet Secretary for Health and Ms. Betty Chemutai Maina, CBS as Cabinet Secretary for Industrialization, Trade and Enterprise Development.

3. APPROVAL HEARING OF THE NOMINEES

- 33. The Committee on Appointments held a sitting on Wednesday, 19th February, 2020 to deliberate on the approval hearing and noted the following
 - (i) THAT, the nominees had not notified the Clerk of the National Assembly of their withdrawal from the approval process as outlined under section 6(10) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approvals) Act, 2011;
 - (ii) THAT, no memoranda had been submitted contesting the suitability of the nominees;
 - (iii)**THAT,** the Committee was to proceed with the approval hearing on Thursday, 20th February 2020 starting at 10.00 am in the Mini Chamber in County Hall, Parliament Buildings; and
 - (iv)**THAT**, the Committee was to examine the nominees against the criteria set out in section 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011.

3.1. HON. MUTAHI KAGWE, EGH – NOMINEE FOR THE POSITION OF CABINET SECRETARY FOR HEALTH

34. Hon. Mutahi Kagwe, EGH appeared before the Committee on Thursday, 20th February, 2020 at 10.05 a.m. and was vetted under oath pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011 and the Standing Orders of the National Assembly. The Committee took note of the following -

Citizenship, Date and Place of Birth

35. He is a male Kenyan citizen, Identity Card Number 4827601, born on 1st January, 1958 in Nyeri County.

Academic and Professional Qualifications

36. The nominee holds a Bachelor of Commerce (Hons) degree from the University of Nairobi, awarded on 18th December, 1981. He sat for the East African Certificate of Education ('O' Level) and the East African Advanced Certificate of Education ('A' Level) Certificate in Kagumo High School, in 1977 and 1975 respectively.

Work and Professional Experience

- 37. In terms of work and professional progression, the nominee is currently serving as the Chairman of Sema House Limited since 2010. He is also currently serving as the Group Executive Director of Tell-Em Public Relations (EA) Limited since 1999 and the Chairman of TNS RMS (East Africa) Limited since 1994.
- 38. He is the immediate former Senator for Nyeri County in the 11th Parliament where he served as the Chairman of the Standing Committee on Information and Technology during the period 2013 to 2017 and also served as the Chairman of the Senate Standing Committee on Education, Information and Technology during the period 2013 to 2014.
- 39. The nominee also served as the Member of Parliament for Mukurweini Constituency in the 9th Parliament (2003 to 2007) where he served as the Chairman of the Committee on Finance, Trade, Tourism and Planning between 2004 and 2005 and was thereafter appointed Minister for Information and Communications until the year 2007.
- 40. He also served as a Marketing Manager at Viva Magazine (between 1981 and 1983); as the Commercial Operations Director of The Standard Limited (various positions from 1983 to 1991); as the Managing Director, Media House Limited (1994 to 1998); as the Chairman of the Multimedia University College of Kenya (2010 to 2012); and as a Member of the Africa Advisory Board of Renaissance Capital Limited (2008 to 2009).

Honours and Awards

- 41. He was awarded Elder of the Golden Heart in December, 2006.
- 42. He was also awarded the Marshal Trophy of Excellence as the second-best student in the Masters of Business Administration (MBA) class of 1992 at United States International University.

Professional Associations

- **43.** The nominee has been involved in the following Professional Associations:
 - (i) The Training for Development Alumni Association (TFD) a USAID/Government of Kenya Project - Former Chair;
 - (ii) Marketing Society of Kenya Former Vice Chair;
 - (iii) Kenya Institute of Management Former Member;
 - (iv) Parliamentarians Network of the World Bank; and
 - (v) Commonwealth Parliamentary Association.

Other Activities and Membership

44. The Nominee is a member of Muthaiga Country Club, the Windsor Golf & Country Club, Karen Country Club, Parklands Sports Club and Nyeri Golf Club.

Public Office, Political Activities and Affiliations

- 45. The nominee submitted that he has held positions in various public offices in addition to those highlighted under the section on work and professional experiences. He was appointed Chairman, Multimedia University College of Kenya in the year 2010 2012.
- 46. Political activities and affiliations held by the nominee include: Member of the Jubilee Party since 2017, former Member of the National Rainbow Coalition Party (NARC) from 2002 to 2017; former Secretary General of the Social Democratic Party (SDP) in 2010 and participated in the 1992 Presidential Elections Campaign strategy team for the Democratic Party of Kenya.

Potential Conflict of Interest

47. The nominee stated that he has no immediate associations that are likely to present potential conflict of interest when he assumes the position. However, the Committee noted that he serves as a Chairperson of various Boards and is a Member of the Kisumu County Social and Economic Council. The nominee indicated that he was honoured and privileged to serve at the Council at the time and there would be consequential degazettement of his position in due course, if he assumes office. This, therefore, never required him to give a resignation letter from that position.

Sources of Income and Net-worth

- **48.** The nominee estimates his net worth to be Kshs. 667,800,000 from the following sources of income
 - (i) TNS RMS (East Africa) Ltd Kshs. 2,625,000 in 2019
 - (ii) Tell-Em Public Relations (EA) Ltd Kshs. 2,872,715 in 2019
 - (iii)TNS RMS East Africa Ltd Kshs. 218,750 in January, 2020

Integrity

- 49. The nominee stated that he has not been dismissed or otherwise removed from office for contravening the provisions of Article 75 of the Constitution. He has also not been adversely associated with practices that depict bias, favouritism or nepotism in the discharge of public duties. He informed the Committee that he has fully complied with his tax obligations to the State for the financial year immediately preceding his nomination for the appointment as evidenced by the Tax Compliance Certificate issued by Kenya Revenue Authority.
- **50.** Further, the nominee submitted that he has not been charged in any court of law in the last three years and neither has he been adversely mentioned in an investigatory report of Parliament or any other Commission of inquiry in the last three years.

3.1.1. General and Sector Specific Questions to Hon. Mutahi Kagwe, EGH

51. In order to assess the nominee's overall suitability on the position, the Committee examined the nominee on general and specific thematic areas which the nominee responded to as follows—

Suitability for appointment

52. On his suitability to serve as Cabinet Secretary for Health, he informed the Committee that serving as a Senator in the 11th Parliament accorded him the opportunity to deal with multiple issues in the health sector. The nominee further stated that he gained experience in senior management over the years that enabled him to gather relevant knowledge and understanding of the sector and the challenges being experienced therein. He undertook to infuse professionalism and protect pilferage of public funds.

Issues to be addressed in the Ministry of Health

- 53. The nominee noted that affordable healthcare is among the four pillars which have been identified in the Government's Big Four Agenda. He further stated that the health sector is a challenge not only in the country, but also worldwide. That notwithstanding, he gave his assurance that Universal Health Care is attainable with adequate collaboration between various stakeholders and related sectors including water and sanitation.
- 54. Hon. Kagwe assured the Committee of his commitment to implement the Fourth Schedule to the Constitution of Kenya particularly on the role of the National Government in the health sector which are mainly functions on Policy and National referral health facilities. He informed Members that the term 'Policy' had a wide scope in its meaning and that it needed to be broken down further in order realise what is encompassed therein.
- 55. He further informed the Committee that it was prudent to have an analysis of the successes and failures realised in the course of implementation of devolution particularly in the health sector. This, according to him, would thereafter call for a consultative meeting between the two levels of Government and arrive at amicable solutions, within the provisions of the law, to rectify the flaws realised.

- 56. He made reference to Articles 186 and 187 of the Constitution which gives guidance on the transfer of functions between the two levels of Government thereby making it possible for the National Government to take up some functions under the County Governments and vice versa if such a need is identified. For example, the National Government may identify the need to take up the management of Level 5 Hospitals owing to their regional nature and the high operational costs for effective maintenance of these facilities. The nominee also noted the need for enhancing equity in access to medical facilities by establishing more Level 5 Hospitals in a cluster of counties.
- 57. In terms of budgetary allocation between the two levels of Government, he submitted that allocation of funds should have a bottom-up approach, based on empirical data related to the sector.
- 58. There is also need for restructuring of various institutions in the sector, including the Kenya Medical Supplies Agency (KEMSA), for instance, automate the supply chain for better transparency.
- 59. The nominee in response to the question of expansion of the Moi Teaching and Referral Hospital based in Eldoret which serves more than 22 Counties, noted that he would address the matter once he assumes office.

National Hospital Insurance Fund (NHIF)

- 60. The nominee admitted that there are issues revolving around the social insurance cover which require urgent attention, for instance, increasing revenue to the Fund. He proposed making contributions to the NHIF mandatory to enable it support universal health care as a means of making healthcare affordable to all citizens regardless of their social status.
- 61. He also proposed change of institutional framework and governance structure of the Fund to make it responsive to the needs of people. For instance, NHIF should be strictly non-profit and ought not to be regulated under the Companies Act as is the case with private health insurance companies. The Fund has also had a high turn-over of Chief Executive Officers and has operated without a substantive CEO for more since 2018.
- **62.** The nominee also observed that there is need to digitise all processes of the Fund to eliminate opportunities for corruption which are rife in the manual system.

Universal Health Care (UHC)

- 63. The nominee proposed tax-based financing of healthcare and increased citizen responsibility towards the realisation of UHC, whereby there would be concerted efforts aimed at ensuring that the most able citizens should be able and willing to take care of those who are least able.
- **64.** To realise this, he assured the Committee that upon approval of his nomination by the National Assembly and subsequent taking office, he shall seek support from the House through legislation to effect his proposals.

65. He also emphasised the need for accurate data on healthcare including common ailments/diseases for better financing of the sector.

Corruption at the Ministry of Health

66. The nominee emphasised the need for a comprehensive digitisation of the systems at the Ministry of Health to eliminate corruption. There is also need for continuous sensitisation of officers in the Ministry on anti-corruption measures.

Potential Conflict of Interest

67. On the question related to his membership to the Kisumu County Social and Economic Council, the nominee informed the Committee that he was honoured and privileged to serve in the Council but upon taking up office as a Cabinet Secretary, he would immediately resign as a Member.

Human Resource in the Health Sector

- 68. The nominee acknowledged the disparity in healthcare personnel in the health sector across the counties. He proposed continuous consultations between the two levels of Government on how to resolve the challenges facing the health sector particularly on personnel, without rolling back the gains realised by devolution. The Health Act has also provided for the Health Human Resources Advisory Council to handle issues of human resources in the two levels of government.
- 69. In a bid to curb the increasing exit of highly-trained healthcare personnel from the public sector to the private sector as well as relocation outside Kenya, the nominee committed to look into remuneration of the personnel as a possible measure of addressing this challenge.

Corona Virus

- 70. The nominee noted that the worldwide data related to Corona virus indicated that there were more than 76,000 people infected with the virus while 2,200 had lost their lives as a result of the same. He further called for handling of this matter with military precision as the disease is yet to be adequately understood.
- 71. He acknowledged improved measures by the Ministry of Health in the screening and preparations should a case of the virus be detected or suspected. He highlighted the increased surveillance of inbound passengers at ports of entry, with six detectors currently available for detection of the virus.
- 72. The government has also ensured isolation of patients suspected to have contracted the virus. The specimen of suspected patients are sent to the National Influenza Centre (NIC) and the Kenya Medical Research Institute (KEMRI) for testing.

73. The nominee further urged the Members of the Committee to support and fast-track the National Disaster Management Authority Bill, currently before the House, in order to enhance response to disaster and save lives.

Discrimination against Persons living with disabilities (PWDs)

74. The nominee submitted that discrimination of any nature, for instance, on the basis of disability, is unconstitutional. He emphasised the need for better handling of patients instead of focusing only on the clinical aspect of treatment. He proposed training of medical personnel of customer care/public relations.

Kenyatta National Referral Hospital

75. On the question of the proposed commercialisation of a section of the Kenyatta National Referral Hospital through the establishment of a private entity at the Hospital, the nominee in his response noted that the purpose of the initiative was to generate funds which would consequently supplement the hospital's public services, a policy proposal he supports.

High Cost of Medical Care

- 76. The nominee acknowledged the high cost of medical treatment particularly for cancer patients who are forced to seek expensive treatment outside Kenya, mostly in India and other developed countries.
- 77. He proposed better equipping of cancer centres in the country and training of specialised personnel to be able to compete with other jurisdictions. He also proposed country-to-country, doctor-to-doctor and hospital-to-hospital collaboration with India to reduce the need for Kenyans to travel there for treatment.
- 78. In his final submissions, the nominee pledged to conduct himself with integrity as demanded by Chapter Six of the Constitution, if approved by the House and subsequently sworn into office.

3.1.2. Committee Observations on the Suitability of the Nominee

- 79. The Committee having considered the nominees filled questionnaire pursuant to section 6(8) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, his curriculum vitae and having heard his oral submission during the approval hearing, made the following Observations on his suitability for appointment as Cabinet Secretary in the Ministry of Health –
 - (1) THAT, in accordance with Article 78(1) and (2) of the Constitution, the nominee is eligible for appointment to State Office since he is a Kenyan citizen born on 1st January 1958 in Nyeri County and does not hold dual citizenship.
 - (2) THAT, the nominee—
 - (i) is currently serving as the Group Executive Director of Tell-Em Public Relations (EA) Limited since 1999 and is also the Chairman of TNS RMS (East Africa) Limited since 1994;

- (ii) he is the immediate former Senator for Nyeri County in the 11th Parliament where he served as the Chairman of the Standing Committee on Information and Technology during the period 2013 to 2017 and also served as the Chairman of the Senate Standing Committee on Education, Information and Technology during the period 2013 to 2014;
- (iii) The nominee also served as the Member of Parliament for Mukurweini Constituency in the 9th Parliament (2003 to 2007) where he served as the Chairman of the Committee on Finance, Trade, Tourism and Planning between 2004 and 2005 and was thereafter appointed Minister for Information and Communications until the year 2007;
- (iv)He also served as a Marketing Manager at Viva Magazine (between 1981 and 1983); as the Commercial Operations Director of The Standard Limited (various positions from 1983 to 1991); as the Managing Director, Media House Limited (1994 to 1998); as the Chairman of the Multimedia University College of Kenya (2010 to 2012); and as a Member of the Africa Advisory Board of Renaissance Capital Limited (2008 to 2009).
- (3) THAT, the nominee was given clearance by the following statutory bodies; the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC), the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), the Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI), Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP) and the Higher Educations Loan Board (HELB).
- (4) THAT, the nominee has not been charged in a court of law in the past three years.
- (5) THAT, the nominee has no potential conflict of interest.
- (6) THAT, the nominee is required not to participate in any other gainful employment during his tenure as a Cabinet Secretary in compliance with the requirements of Article 77(1) of the Constitution.
- (7) THAT, though the nominee is a member of Jubilee Party, he does not hold office in any political party.
- (8) THAT, the nominee has never been dismissed from office under Article 75 of the Constitution for contravention of the provisions of Articles 75(1) (conflict of interest), Article 76 (financial probity), Article 77 (restriction on activities of State Officers) and Article 78(2) (dual citizenship) of the Constitution.
- (9) THAT, nominee demonstrated knowledge of topical, administrative and technical issues touching on the Ministry of Health and has the requisite abilities, qualifications and experience.

3.2. MS. BETTY CHEMUTAI MAINA, CBS – NOMINEE FOR THE POSITION OF CABINET SECRETARY FOR INDUSTRIALIZATION, TRADE & ENTERPRISE DEVELOPMENT

80. Ms. Betty Chemutai Maina, CBS appeared before the Committee on Thursday, 20th February, 2020 at 12.00 am and was vetted under oath pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution, Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011 and the Standing Orders of the National Assembly. The Committee took note of the following -

Citizenship, Date and Place of Birth

81. She is a female Kenyan citizen, Identity Card Number 7698687, born on 3rd April, 1965 in Sosiot, Kericho County.

Academic and Professional Qualifications

- 82. She holds a Master of Science Degree in Development, Planning and Administration from the University College London (1998) and a Bachelor of Arts degree in Land Economics from the University of Nairobi (1988). She sat for her Kenya Advanced Certificate of Education (KACE) examination in 1983 at Alliance Girls High School.
- 83. She has also attained various certificates for Short Courses from Strathmore University in Public Policy Making, Strategy in Action, The CEO and Strategy (2007-2014) and Certificate in Public Sector Budgeting Course from the Harvard Institute for International Development (2000).

Work and Professional Experience

- 84. In terms of work and professional progression, the nominee has served as Principal Secretary from December 2015 to date in various State Departments including the State Department for East African Affairs (December 2015 to January 2018); State Department of Industrialization (February 2018 to September 2019), Ministry of Environment and Forestry (September 2019 to date).
- 85. She has also served in other positions in the private sector that include:
 - October 2015 to December 2015: East Africa Partner, Genesis Analytics (Economic Consultants);
 - (ii) July 2015 to date: Director, BECEM Solutions (Consultants);
 - (iii) July 2004 to June 2015: Chief Executive Officer, Kenya Association of Manufacturers;
 - (iv) 2013 to 2016: Member of the Laikipia University Council;
 - (v) July 2012 to May 2013: Member of the UN Secretary General's High-Level Panel on Post-2015 Development Agenda Chaired by President Ellen Johnson Sirleaf (Liberia), Prime Minister David Cameron (UK) and President Yudhohono (Indonesia);

91. The nominee stated that she has no immediate associations that are likely to present potential conflict of interest when she assumes the position.

 - (vi) Board memberships (Anti-Counterfeit Agency and Laikipia University) in 2014: 8 meetings @20,000 =160,000;
 - (vii) Miscellaneous income from farming.

Integrity

- 93. The nominee stated that she has not been dismissed or otherwise removed from office for contravening the provisions of Article 75 of the Constitution. She has also not been adversely associated with practices that depict bias, favouritism or nepotism in the discharge of public duties. She has fully complied with the tax obligations to the State for the financial year immediately preceding his nomination for the appointment.
- 94. She further submitted that she has not been charged in any court of law in the past three years or been adversely mentioned in an investigatory report of Parliament or any other Commission of inquiry in the past three years.

3.2.1 General and Sector Specific Questions to Ms. Betty Chemutai Maina, CBS

95. In order to assess the nominee's overall suitability for the position, the Committee examined the nominee on general and specific thematic areas which the nominee responded to as follows: -

Pending Bills

- 96. The Committee raised concerns on the astronomical pending bills which have affected Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) and the Kenyan economy. The nominee submitted that the issue of pending bills was a big problem in government and that in the previous financial year, the Government closed with nearly Kshs.58 billion pending bills and it considered that at least Kshs.15 billion of that was payable. The rest needed further verification.
- 97. The nominee also submitted that the Cabinet Secretary for the National Treasury and Planning had announced that by 14th February, 2020, the Government had paid more than Kshs.12 billion of the pending bills. The remaining Kshs. 43 billion of the pending bills was contested and required more verification and documentation. The challenges that gave rise to pending bills were enumerated as lack of sufficient documentation and budgeting with fairly ambitious revenue projections but which the Exchequer could not meet.
- **98.** The nominee stated that if approved and appointed, she will propose regulations on prompt payment that bind both government and the private sector to ensure prompt payment of suppliers of goods and services to government.

Promoting and Protecting Small Medium Enterprises (SMEs)

- 99. The nominee informed the Committee that while the government strives to promote setting up of cottage industries for small scale businesses, its war on counterfeits is to protect all consumers and therefore a small and medium enterprise business person does not have to engage in an illegal activity and can actually produce genuine, standard products that are certified by the Kenya National Bureau of Standards. In addition, the nominee extolled the Buy Kenya, Build Kenya initiative and called for Parliament to support preference for a product that is made within Kenya or that has sufficient value addition from the country.
- 100. The nominee submitted that the Ministry is currently reviewing the SME Policy considering that approximately 90% (per cent) of the businesses in Kenya are SMEs. The policy will be geared towards creating an eco-system that supports start-up. She further submitted that the government has a policy to support local business in securing government contracts through procurement entities.

Industrial Attachment and Levy Contributions

101. The nominee stated that it was a legal requirement for industry players to contribute to National Industrial Training Authority (NITA) which supports industrial attachments for graduates so as to promote skill-based industrial training. The nominee submitted that there is need to expand the pool of contributors and make contributions mandatory so as to cater for more beneficiaries. The nominee undertook to take steps to ensure that more young

people benefit from apprenticeships, if approved and appointed to the position of Cabinet Secretary.

VAT Refunds

102. The nominee submitted that the issue of refunds for local manufacturers has been ongoing. Together with her colleagues in the relevant Ministries, they have been addressing the issue and if approved and appointed, she will continue engaging KRA on the matter to ensure manufacturers are promptly refunded as envisaged.

Export Processing Zones and Provision of Incentives to Local Manufacturers

- 103. The nominee was questioned on the need to lower export tax or provide a commensurate increase on import tax on goods other than import inputs in order to protect local manufacturers, particularly the EPZ.
- 104. The nominee responded that that the investors based at the EPZ benefit from many incentives in order to promote Kenyan exports. She also added that the investors there are not necessarily foreigners. There is however, need to address challenges facing the local manufacturing so as spur growth in that sector.

Diamond Mark of Quality and Pre-inspection of Imports

- 105. The nominee submitted that pre-inspection of imports is aimed at ensuring that only quality imports get into the country and are not re-exported in case they do not meet set standards after importation. The Diamond Mark of Quality is awarded to manufacturers (either based locally or abroad) who have demonstrated a high degree of excellence in product manufacturing and quality.
- 106. The Members were concerned about importers losing money through taxation if their goods are found to not have met the set standards. Their ought to be mechanism of either refunding the importers or effecting taxation once the goods have passed the quality test for importation.

Second-Hand Imported Goods (Mitumba)

- 107. The nominee cautioned Kenyans against dependency on imported second-hand items, particularly under garments. She encouraged them to pride themselves in buying locally made goods whose quality has greatly improved over time.
- 108. The Members of the Committee however, were concerned about the affordability of the locally-manufactured goods and the implications of a freeze on imported second-hand goods on the many livelihoods dependent on that sector, for instance the Gikomba market traders.
- 109. The nominee assured the Committee that the pre-inspection heightened measures on imported goods are meant to protect Kenya from being a dumping ground for unwanted items and ensure that only quality and safe products are admitted into the market.

Effect of Corona Virus on the Economy

110. The nominee acknowledged the negative effect the corona virus is likely to have on the economy, particularly on importation of goods from China given the close business

relationship between the two countries. She proposed the need for Kenyans to diversify their markets and secure new partners in a bid to mitigate the risk of a slower economy.

Effects of Kenya's proposed bilateral Free Trade Agreement with the United States of America on Africa Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA)

111. The nominee submitted that the bilateral trade agreement has not yet been signed but talks on the matter are ongoing. The proposed Agreement is expected to succeed the African Growth and Opportunities Act (AGOA) Agreement which expires in the year 2025. She assured the Committee that the Government will ensure Kenya's interests are not compromised in the Agreement.

Technical Training Institutes

- 112. On the challenges faced by Technical Training Institutes, the nominee stated that there was insufficient enrolment and that the youth do not appreciate and have not valued technical training. She submitted that there is need to popularize technical training institutions in the constituencies.
- 113. The nominee informed the Committee that the Ministry of Industrialization, Trade and Enterprise Development has established manufacturing facilities in all constituencies. The jua kali sheds that were developed as part of the economic stimulus program and stalled have been allocated funds to ensure their completion. The nominee further informed the Committee that the Ministry of Transport, Infrastructure, Housing, Urban Development and Public Works has allocated funds to improve accessibility of the roads leading to these facilities.

Challenges faced by Persons with Disabilities (PWDs) in doing Business

114. The nominee submitted that there is need for continuous engagement with PWDs in order to secure their rights, address their challenges and ensure they thrive in business. The nominee noted that there is a need to recognize PWDs in market facilities planning and to ensure their fair treatment.

3.2.2 Committee Observations on the suitability of the Nominee

industrial development. She holds a Master of Science degree in Development Administration and Planning, from University College of London and Bachelor's degree in Land Economics, from the University of Nairobi. Her academic credentials, professional training and experience thus comply with section 6 (7) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, No. 33 of 2011.

- 3) THAT, the nominee was given clearance by the following statutory bodies; the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC), the Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), the Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI), Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP) and the Higher Educations Loan Board (HELB).
- 4) THAT, the nominee has not been charged in a court of law in the past three years.
- 5) THAT, the nominee has no potential conflict of interest.
- 6) THAT, the nominee is required not to participate in any other gainful employment during her tenure as a Cabinet Secretary in compliance with the requirements of Article 77(1) of the Constitution.
- 7) THAT, the nominee does not hold office in any political party.
- 8) THAT, the nominee has never been dismissed from office under Article 75 of the Constitution for contravention of the provisions of Articles 75(1) (conflict of interest), Article 76 (financial probity), Article 77 (restriction on activities of State Officers) and Article 78(2) (dual citizenship) of the Constitution.
- 9) THAT, the nominee the nominee exhibited knowledge of topical, administrative and technical issues touching on the Ministry of Industrialization, Trade & Enterprise Development and has the requisite abilities, qualifications and experience.

3 COMMITTEE GENERAL OBSERVATIONS

- (v) Providing for additional sections in the Act and Schedule in order to address various issues that will further enhance the conduct of parliamentary approval;
- (2) Article 130 (2) of the Constitution provides that the composition of the National Executive shall reflect the regional and ethnic diversity of the people of Kenya whereas section 7 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act (No. 33 of 2011) lists one of the issues for consideration in a parliamentary approval as any constitutional or statutory requirements. There is however, need for a clear definition of what regional diversity entails considering that Kenya is divided into Counties and not regions.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The meeting commenced at thirty minutes past noon with the Prayer.

The Speaker of the National Assembly / Committee Chairperson welcomed Members to the second meeting of the day for the approval hearing of the nominee to the position of Cabinet Secretary for Industrialisation, Trade and Industry.

VETTING OF MS BETTY CHEMUTAI MAINA, CBS, CABINET SECRETARY NOMINEE FOR MINISTRY OF INDUSTRIALIZATION, TRADE AND ENTERPRISE DEVELOPMENT

Ms. Betty Chemutai Maina, CBS, the Cabinet Secretary nominee for the Ministry of Industrialization, Trade and Enterprise Development appeared before the Committee on Thursday 20th February, 2020 at 12.30 p.m. and was orally examined pursuant to the provisions of the Constitution of Kenya, the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011, the Leadership and Integrity Act, 2012 and the Standing Orders of the National Assembly.

The nominee was examined under Oath which was administered in accordance with the provisions of Standing Order No. 191 and the 6th Schedule to the Standing Orders.

Citizenship, Date and Place of Birth

The nominee is a Kenyan, female citizen, Identity Card Number 7698687, born on 3rd April, 1965 in Sosiot, Kericho County.

The nominee stated that she has no immediate associations that are likely to present potential conflict of interest when she assumes the position.

Sources of Income and Net-worth

The nominee submitted that her net worth is approximately Kshs. 117.5 Million derived from the following sources of income –

- (i) Salary at the State Department of Industrialization: Kshs. 9,691,369 in 2019 and Kshs. 10,719,504 in 2018:
- (ii) State Department of East African Community: Kshs. 12,344,000 in 2017 and Kshs. 11,396,194 in 2016;
- (iii) Kenya Association of Manufacturers: Salary and gratuity of Kshs. 15,174,126 in 2015;
- (iv) Consulting (October November 2015): Kshs. 3,000,000;
- (v) Kenya Association of Manufacturers: Salary of Kshs. 10,343,580 in 2014;
- (vi) Board memberships (Anti-Counterfeit Agency and Laikipia University) in 2014: 8 meetings @20,000 =160,000;
- (vii) Miscellaneous income from farming.

Integrity

The nominee stated that she has not been dismissed or otherwise removed from office for contravening the provisions of Article 75 of the Constitution. She has also not been adversely associated with practices that depict bias, favouritism or nepotism in the discharge of public duties.

She has fully complied with the tax obligations to the State for the financial year immediately preceding his nomination for the appointment.

She further submitted that she has not been charged in any court of law in the last three years or been adversely mentioned in an investigatory report of Parliament or any other Commission of inquiry in the last three years.

General and Sector Specific Questions to Ms. Betty Chemutai Maina, CBS

In order to assess the nominee's overall suitability for the position, the Committee examined the nominee on general and specific thematic areas which the nominee responded as follows: -

Pending Bills

The Committee raised concerns on the astronomical pending bills which have affected Small and Medium Enterprises (SMEs) and the Kenyan economy. The nominee submitted that the issue of pending bills was a big problem in government and that in the previous financial year, the Government closed with nearly Kshs.58 billion pending bills and it considered that at least Kshs.15 billion of that was payable. The rest needed further verification.

The Nominee also submitted that the Cabinet Secretary for the National Treasury and Planning had announced that by 14th February, 2020, the Government had paid more than Kshs.12 billion of the pending bills. The remaining Kshs. 43 billion of the pending bills was contested and required more verification and documentation. The challenges that gave rise to pending bills were enumerated as lack of sufficient documentation and budgeting with fairly ambitious revenue projections but which the Exchequer could not meet.

The nominee stated that if approved and appointed, she will propose regulations on prompt payment that binds both government and the private sector to ensure prompt payment of suppliers of goods and services to government.

Promoting and Protecting Small Medium Enterprises (SMEs)

The nominee informed the Committee that while the government strives to promote setting up of cottage industries for small scale businesses, its war on counterfeits is to protect all consumers and therefore a small and medium enterprise business person does not have to engage in an illegal activity and can actually produce genuine, standard products that are certified by the Kenya National Bureau of Standards. In addition, the nominee extolled the Buy Kenya, Build Kenya initiative and called for Parliament to support preference for a product that is made within Kenya or that has sufficient value addition from the country.

The nominee submitted that the Ministry is currently reviewing the SME Policy considering that approximately 90% (per cent) of the businesses in Kenya are SMEs. The policy will be geared towards creating an eco-system that supports start-up. She further submitted that the government has a policy to support local business in securing government contracts through procurement entities.

Industrial Attachment and Levy Contributions

The nominee stated that it was a legal requirement for industry players to contribute to National Industrial Training Authority (NITA) which supports industrial attachments for graduates so as to promote skill-based industrial training. The nominee submitted that there is need to expand the pool of contributors and make contributions mandatory so as to cater for more beneficiaries. The nominee

undertook to take steps to ensure that more young people benefit from apprenticeships, if approved and appointed to the position of Cabinet Secretary.

VAT Refunds

The nominee submitted that the issue of refunds for local manufacturers has been ongoing. Together with her colleagues in the relevant Ministries, they have been addressing the issue and if approved and appointed, she will continue engaging KRA on the matter to ensure manufacturers are promptly refunded as envisaged.

Export Processing Zones and Provision of Incentives to Local Manufacturers

The nominee was questioned on the need to lower export tax or provide a commensurate increase on import tax on goods other than import inputs in order to protect local manufacturers, particularly the EPZ.

The nominee responded that that the investors based at the EPZ benefit from many incentives in order to promote Kenyan exports. She also added that the investors there are not necessarily foreigners. There is however, need to address challenges facing the local manufacturing so as spur growth in that sector.

Diamond Mark of Quality and Pre-inspection of Imports

The nominee submitted that pre-inspection of imports is aimed at ensuring that only quality imports get into the country and are not re-exported in case they do not meet set standards after importation. The Diamond Mark of Quality is awarded to manufacturers (either based locally or abroad) who have demonstrated a high degree of excellence in product manufacturing and quality.

The Members were concerned about importers losing money through taxation if their goods are found to not have met the set standards. There ought to be mechanism of either refunding the importers or effecting taxation once the goods have passed the quality test for importation.

Second-Hand Imported Goods (Mitumba)

The nominee cautioned Kenyans against dependency on imported second-hand items, particularly under garments. She encouraged them to pride themselves in buying locally made goods whose quality has greatly improved over time.

The Members of the Committee however, were concerned about the affordability of the locally-manufactured goods and the implications of a freeze on imported second-hand goods on the many livelihoods dependent on that sector, for instance the Gikomba market traders.

The nominee assured the Committee that the pre-inspection heightened measures on imported goods are meant to protect Kenya from being a dumping ground for unwanted items and ensure that only quality and safe products are admitted into the market.

Effect of Corona Virus on the Economy

The nominee acknowledged the negative effect the corona virus is likely to have on the economy, particularly on importation of goods from China given the close business relationship between the two countries. She proposed the need for Kenyans to diversify their markets and secure new partners in a bid to mitigate the risk of a slower economy.

Effects of Kenya's proposed bilateral Free Trade Agreement with the United States of America on Africa Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA)

The nominee submitted that the bilateral trade agreement has not yet been signed but talks on the matter are ongoing. The proposed Agreement is expected to succeed the African Growth and Opportunities Act (AGOA) Agreement which expires in the year 2025. She assured the Committee that the Government will ensure Kenya's interests are not compromised in the Agreement.

Technical Training Institutes

On the challenges faced by Technical Training Institutes, the nominee stated that there was insufficient enrolment and that the youth do not appreciate and have not valued technical training. She submitted that there is need to popularize technical training institutions in the constituencies.

The nominee informed the Committee that the Ministry of Industrialization, Trade and Enterprise Development has established manufacturing facilities in all constituencies. The *jua kali* sheds that were developed as part of the economic stimulus program and stalled have been allocated funds to ensure their completion. The nominee further informed the Committee that the Ministry of Transport, Infrastructure, Housing, Urban Development and Public Works has allocated funds to improve accessibility of the roads leading to these facilities.

Challenges faced by Persons Living with Disabilities (PWDs) in doing Business

The nominee submitted that there is need for continuous engagement with PWDs in order to secure their rights, address their challenges and ensure they thrive in business. The nominee noted that there is a need to recognize PWDs in market facilities planning and to ensure their fair treatment.

Marshal Trophy of Excellence as the second-best student in the Masters of Business Administration (MBA) class of 1992 at the United States International University.

He graduated as the best student in Marketing in the class of 1992, an award issued by the Marketing Society of Kenya.

Income and Net Worth

The nominee estimates his net worth to be Kshs. 667,800,000 from the following sources of income -

- (i) TNS RMS (East Africa) Ltd Kshs. 2,625,000 in 2019
- (ii) Tell-Em Public Relations (EA) Ltd Kshs. 2,872,715 in 2019
- (iii)TNS RMS East Africa Ltd Kshs. 218,750 in January, 2020

Professional Associations and Memberships

- (i) Former Chairman of the Training for Development Alumni Association (TFD) a USAID/Government of Kenya project;
- (ii) Former Vice Chairman of the Marketing Society of Kenya;
- (iii)Former Member of the Kenya Institute of Management, Parliamentarians Network of the World Bank and the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association;

(iv) He is a member of Muthaiga Country Club, Windsor Golf and Country Club, Karen Country Club, Parklands Sports Club and Nyeri Golf Club.

Potential Conflicts of Interest

The nominee declared that he currently doesn't know of any persons or matter that would present a potential conflict of interest should he assume the position of Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Health. Should a conflict of interest arise, the nominee stated that he would declare the interest in writing to the appointing authority in accordance with the law.

Integrity

The nominee has complied with all the provisions of Chapter 6 of the Constitution on Leadership and Integrity and has been cleared by the Directorate of Criminal Investigation, the Higher Education Loans Board, the Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission, the Kenya Revenue Authority, Office of the Registrar of Political Parties. The nominee also presented a clearance certificate from the Credit Reference Bureau.

The nominee has also neither been charged in a court of law nor mentioned in any investigatory report of Parliamentary or any Commission of Inquiry in the last three (3) years. He has also never been dismissed or otherwise removed from office for contravention of the provisions of Article 75 of the Constitution.

GENERAL AND SECTOR SPECIFIC QUESTIONS TO THE NOMINEE

In order to assess his overall suitability on the position, the Committee examined the nominee on general and specific thematic areas which the nominee responded as follows: -

Suitability for appointment

On his suitability to serve as Cabinet Secretary for Health, he informed the Committee that serving as a Senator in the 11th Parliament accorded him the opportunity to deal with multiple issues in the health sector. The nominee further stated that he gained experience in senior management over the years enabled him to gather relevant knowledge and understanding of the sector and the challenges being experienced therein. He undertook to infuse professionalism and protect pilferage of public funds.

Issues to be addressed in the Ministry of Health

The nominee noted that affordable healthcare is among the four pillars which have been identified in the Government's Big Four Agenda. He further stated that the health sector is a challenge not only in the country, but also worldwide. That notwithstanding, he gave his assurance that Universal Health Care is attainable with adequate collaboration between various stakeholders and related sectors including water and sanitation.

Hon. Kagwe assured the Committee of his commitment to implement the Fourth Schedule to the Constitution of Kenya particularly on the role of the National Government in the health sector which are mainly functions on Policy and National referral health facilities. He informed Members that the term 'Policy' had a wide scope in its meaning and that it needed to be broken down further in order realise what is encompassed therein.

He further informed the Committee that it was prudent to have an analysis of the successes and failures realised in the course of implementation of devolution particularly in the health sector. This, according

to him, would thereafter call for a consultative meeting between the two levels of Government and arrive at amicable solutions, within the provisions of the law, to rectify the flaws realised.

He made reference to Articles 186 and 187 of the Constitution which gives guidance on the transfer of functions between the two levels of Government thereby making it possible for the National Government to take up some functions under the County Governments and vice versa if such a need is identified. For example, the National Government may identify the need to take up the management of Level 5 Hospitals owing to their regional nature and the high operational costs for effective maintenance of these facilities.

In terms of budgetary allocation between the two levels of Government, he opined that allocation of funds should have a bottom-up approach, based on empirical data related to the sector.

There is also need for restructuring of various institutions in the sector, including the Kenya Medical Supplies Agency (KEMSA), for instance, automate the supply chain for better transparency.

The nominee in response to the question of expansion of the Moi Teaching and Referral Hospital based in Eldoret which serves more than 22 Counties, noted that he would address the matter once he assumes office.

National Hospital Insurance Fund (NHIF)

The nominee admitted that there are issues revolving around the social insurance cover which require urgent attention, for instance, increasing revenue to the Fund. He proposed making contributions to the NHIF mandatory to enable it support universal health care as a means of making healthcare affordable to all citizens regardless of their social status.

He also proposed change of institutional framework and governance structure of the Fund to make it responsive to the needs of people. For instance, NHIF should be strictly non-profit and ought not to be regulated under the Companies Act as is the case with private health insurance companies. The Fund has also had a high turn-over of Chief Executive Officers and has operated without a substantive CEO for more since 2018.

The nominee also observed that there is need to digitise all processes of the Fund to eliminate opportunities for corruption which are rife in the manual system.

Universal Health Care (UHC)

The nominee proposed tax-based financing of healthcare and increased citizen responsibility towards the realisation of UHC, whereby there would be concerted efforts aimed at ensuring that the most able citizens should be able and willing to take care of those who are least able.

To realise this, he assured the Committee that upon approval of his nomination by the National Assembly and subsequent taking office, he shall seek support from the House through legislation to effect his proposals.

He also emphasised the need for accurate data on healthcare including common ailments/diseases for better financing of the sector.

Corruption at the Ministry of Health

The nominee emphasised the need for a comprehensive digitisation of the systems at the Ministry of Health to eliminated corruption. There is also need for continuous sensitisation of officers in the Ministry on anti-corruption measures.

Potential Conflict of Interest

On the question related to his membership to the Kisumu County Social and Economic Council, the nominee informed the Committee that he was honoured and privileged to serve in the Council but upon taking up office as a Cabinet Secretary, he would immediately resign as a Member.

Human Resource in the Health Sector

The nominee acknowledged the disparity in healthcare personnel in the health sector across the counties. He proposed continuous consultations between the two levels of Government on how to resolve the challenges facing the health sector particularly on personnel, without rolling back the gains realised by devolution. The Health Act has also provided for the Health Human Resources Advisory Council to handle issues of human resources in the two levels of government.

In a bid to curb the increasing exit of highly-trained healthcare personnel from the public sector to the private sector as well as relocation outside Kenya, the nominee committed to look into remuneration of the personnel as a possible measure of addressing this challenge.

Corona Virus

The nominee noted that the worldwide data related to Corona virus indicated that there were more than 76,000 people infected with the virus while 2,200 had lost their lives as a result of the same. He further called for handling of this matter with military precision as the disease is yet to be adequately understood.

He acknowledged improved measures by the Ministry of Health in the screening and preparations should a case of the virus be detected or suspected. He highlighted the increased surveillance of inbound passengers at ports of entry, with six detectors currently available for detection of the virus.

The government has also ensured isolation of patients suspected to have contracted the virus. The specimen of suspected patients are sent to the National Influenza Centre (NIC) and the Kenya Medical Research Institute (KEMRI) for testing.

The nominee further urged the Members of the Committee to support and fast-track the National Disaster Management Authority Bill, currently before the House, in order to enhance response to disaster and save lives.

Discrimination against Persons living with disabilities (PWDs)

The nominee opined that discrimination of any nature, for instance, on the basis of disability, is unconstitutional. He emphasised the need for better handling of patients instead of focusing only on the clinical aspect of treatment. He proposed training of medical personnel of customer care/public relations.

Kenyatta National Referral Hospital

On the question of the proposed commercialisation of a section of the Kenyatta National Referral Hospital through the establishment of a private entity at the Hospital, the nominee in his response noted that the purpose of the initiative was to generate funds which would consequently supplement the hospital's public services, a policy proposal he supports.

High cost of medical care

The nominee acknowledged the high cost of medical treatment particularly for cancer patients who are forced to seek expensive treatment outside Kenya, mostly in India and other developed countries.

He proposed better equipping of cancer centres in the country and training of specialised personnel to be able to compete with other jurisdictions. He also proposed country-to-country, doctor-to-doctor and hospital-to-hospital collaboration with India to reduce the need for Kenyans to travel there for treatment.

In his final submissions, the nominee pledged to conduct himself with integrity as demanded by Chapter Six of the Constitution, if approved by the House and subsequently sworn into office.

On 5 April I took office as Prime Minister of Denmark and I look very much forward to take part in the important work of the Africa Commission as Chairman. I wish to take this opportunity to underline that and the Danish government are fully committed to the high ambition and significant initiatives of the Africa Commission.

It is my sincere pleasure to invite you to the final meeting of the Africa Commission which will take place in Copenhagen on 6 May.

Since the first meeting of the Africa Commission a little less than a year ago, we have witnessed a changing global environment. During our discussions in April last year we were preoccupied with finding appropriate responses to the fuel crisis and the food crisis. Today we are facing one of the serious challenges of a global economic crisis which has its genesis in the developed world, but which threatens to hit the less developed world very hard.

They have also provided invaluable contributions and helped improve the recommendations and the five initiatives: 1) access to investment finance for SMEs, 2) access to sustainable energy in off grid communities, 3) unleashing African entrepreneurship, 4) benchmarking African competitiveness, 5) linking higher education, research and business in agriculture, and technical vocational skills development. As regards our focus on value chains, our analysis and consultations have suggested that the need for actively promoting a value chain approach should constitute a general recommendation of the Commission and be integrated in a number of initiatives.

As you know, each event has been co-hosted by some of our fellow Commissioners, who have played an important role in ensuring the success of the conferences. I would in this regard like to thank you for co-hosting the thematic conference in Nairobi on Climate Change and the upcoming conference in Kampala on Economic Growth. In addition to the thematic conferences, two youth forums will be organized under the auspices of the Commission.

The various activities have confirmed that our emphasis on youth, employment and economic growth is indeed the right focus, at the right time. We need to increase our efforts to find the most effective means of improving the job opportunities of young Africans. Each African country will have to develop its own strategy for improving growth and employment – led by the private sector, but supported by government policies and effective assistance from development partners.

In my view the Commission will fill a vacuum by focusing less on developing new attempts on general policies and strategies - and more on concrete, implementable initiatives, which will have a direct impact on the everyday life of the African Youth. I hope you will agree with me that this should be our collective ambition.

The second meeting of the Commission will, as you know, take place in Addis Ababa on 20. November 2008. I look forward to our discussions which will steer our work in the final phase. Prior to the meeting in Addis Ababa, we will circulate a paper containing a condensed set of draft recommendations for concrete initiatives. It is my intention that this paper will provide the basis for our deliberations. In anticipation of our meeting I attach a short non-paper with some initial reflections on possible initiatives. Your thoughts and ideas on the paper and the preliminary initiatives would be highly appreciated.

After our meeting in Addis Ababa, four workshops could be organized, where 10-15 international experts and key stakeholders in development cooperation with Africa elaborate and further develop the recommendations and priorities that we have formulated in Addis Ababa. All Commissioners are of course very welcome to participate in these workshops.

As foreseen, we will present the final report in May 2009. At this meeting, which will take place on Thursday 7 May in Copenhagen, I would also like for us to agree on an action plan, which outlines implementation measures and commitments from our side. It is my hope that each Commissioner, as a key stakeholder in international development cooperation with Africa, will actively help ensuring support for the recommendations of the Africa Commission and promote implementation of the suggested initiatives. As previously stated, I can assure you that Denmark will be in the forefront and that the recommendations will, of course, be reflected in Danish development cooperation with Africa.

I look forward to seeing you in Addis Ababa on 20 November 2008.
