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#### CHAIRPERSON'S FORWARD

This report contains the deliberations of the Departmental Committee on Finance and National Planning during its consideration of His Excellency the President's Reservation on the Parliamentary Pensions (Amendment) Bill (National Assembly Bill No. 45 of 2019).

The Bill was passed by the National Assembly on **Wednesday**, 5<sup>th</sup> **August**, **2020**. The Bill was seeking to amend the Parliamentary Pensions Act (Cap. 196) in order to raise the amount of pension due to former Members of Parliament who served between 1<sup>st</sup> July, 1984 and 1<sup>st</sup> January, 2001 to a minimum sum of Kenya Shillings one hundred thousand.

In line with the powers conferred by Article 115 of the Constitution, H.E. the President expressed his reservation to assent to the Parliamentary Pensions (Amendment) Bill, 2019. Consequently, the Memorandum was sent to the National Assembly on 7<sup>th</sup> September, 2020 detailing the reasons for his reservations. Thereafter, the Speaker vide his Communication No. 07 of 2020 dated 10<sup>th</sup> September, 2020 conveyed the Message containing the President's Memorandum on the Bill. The Memorandum was subsequently referred to the Committee for consideration and reporting to the House pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 154(2) which requires the House to consider the President's Reservation within twenty (21) days upon receipt of the Memorandum.

In line with the Speakers Communication, the Committee proceeded to consider the President's Memorandum in a meeting held on Tuesday, 22<sup>nd</sup> September, 2020. The deliberations formed the basis on which the committee made its decision.

The Committee thanks the Offices of the Speaker and the Clerk of the National Assembly for the technical support extended to it in the process of considering the President's reservations to the Parliamentary Pensions (Amendment) Bill (N.A. Bill No. 45 of 2019). In addition, I thank Members of the Committee and the secretariat for their sacrifice and commitment in considering the President's reservations to the Bill.

Hon. Speaker, the Committee having considered the President's Memorandum and recommendations therein **DOES NOT AGREE** with the President's Reservations to the Parliamentary Pensions (Amendment) Bill (N.A. Bill No. 45 of 2019).

#### 1 PREFACE

#### 1.1 ESTABLISHMENT OF THE COMMITTEE

  - x. To examine any questions raised by Members on a matter within its mandate.

## 2 THE PRESIDENT'S RESERVATIONS TO THE PARLIAMENTARY PENSIONS (AMENDMENT) BILL (NATIONAL ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 45 OF 2019)

- 6. The Parliamentary Pensions (Amendment) Bill (National Assembly Bill No. 45 of 2019) was passed by the National Assembly on **Wednesday**, 5<sup>th</sup> **August**, **2020**. The Bill was seeking to amend the Parliamentary Pensions Act (Cap. 196) in order to raise the amount of pension due to former Members of Parliament who served between 1<sup>st</sup> July, 1984 and 1<sup>st</sup> January, 2001 to a minimum sum of Kenya Shillings one hundred thousand.
- 7. In line with the powers conferred by Article 115 of the Constitution, H.E. the President expressed his reservation to assent to the Parliamentary Pensions (Amendment) Bill, 2019. Consequently, the Memorandum was sent to the National Assembly on 7<sup>th</sup> September, 2020 detailing the reasons for his reservations. Thereafter, the Speaker vide a communication dated 10<sup>th</sup> September, 2020 conveyed the President's Memorandum on the Bill and subsequently referred it to the Departmental Committee on Finance and National Planning for consideration.

#### 2.1 PRESIDENT'S RESERVATION

Through his Memorandum dated 7<sup>th</sup> September, 2020, His Excellency the President submitted that:-

8. In exercise of powers conferred to him under Article 115(1)(b) of the Constitution, he declined to assent to the Parliamentary Pensions (Amendment) Bill, 2019 because of clause 2 of the Bill. The Bill was seeking to amend section 8 of the Parliamentary Pensions Act (Cap. 196) to provide for an entitlement for former Members of Parliament who served between 1<sup>st</sup> July, 1984 and 1<sup>st</sup> January, 2001 to a monthly pension of one hundred thousand shillings.

#### 2.2 REASONS FOR REFUSAL TO ASSENT

H.E. the President refused to assent to the Bill because of the following reasons:-

- 9. Members pensions under the Act are calculated according to the contributions paid into the Scheme during their parliamentary term. The proposed amendment fails to provide for such calculation and makes no reference to the Members' contributions;
- 10. The Bill overlooks the mandate of the Salaries and Remuneration Commission under the Constitution, which comprises, among other things, the setting and review of remuneration and benefits for all state officers who include Members of Parliament; and,
- 11. The proposed pension payment will result in an annual cost implication of about four hundred and forty-four (444) million shillings. Added to this, will be the almost certain demand for similar upward review of pension benefits by other retired state and public officers, which is within their rights to demand. The resultant ripple effect is unaffordable and fiscally unsustainable.
- 12. It is for the above reasons that H.E. the President recommended deletion of clause 2 of the Bill, which as a matter of fact, is the primary content of the Bill.

### 3 CONSIDERATION OF THE PRESIDENT'S MEMORANDUM ON THE PARLIAMENTARY PENSIONS (AMENDMENT) BILL (NATIONAL ASSEMBLY BILL NO. 45 OF 2019)

- 13. The Committee held a meeting on **Tuesday**, **22**<sup>nd</sup> **September**, **2020** to deliberate on the President's reservations to the Parliamentary Pensions (Amendment) Bill, 2019. In considering the Memorandum, the Committee noted that the President's reasons for refusal to assent to the Bill were valid but do not take the following into consideration:
  - i. inflation and high cost of living in the country which makes it impossible for the former Members of Parliament to survive on the pensions that they are earning currently; and
  - ii. difficulties that former Members of Parliament go through after their service in terms of employability unlike other government employees.

#### **4 COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION**

14. The Committee having considered the President's Reservations to the Parliamentary Pensions (Amendment) Bill, 2019 recommends that the House agrees with its decision to **REJECT** the President's Memorandum and the recommendation to delete Clause 2 of the Bill.

- 2. The Bill overlooks the mandate of the Salaries and Remuneration Commission under the Constitution, which comprises, among other things, the setting and review of remuneration and benefits for all state officers who include Members of Parliament; and,
- 3. The proposed pension payment will result in an annual cost implication of about four hundred and forty-four (444) million shillings. Added to this, will be the almost certain demand for similar upward review of pension benefits by other retired state and public officers, which is within their rights to demand. The resultant ripple effect is unaffordable and fiscally unsustainable.

Members deliberated extensively on the Memorandum and resolved to agree with the President's Reservations because it failed to take into account of the following factors:-

- 1. inflation and high cost of living in the country which makes it impossible for the former Members of Parliament to survive on the pensions that they are earning currently; and
- 2. difficulties that former Members of Parliament experience after their service in terms of securing employment unlike other government employees.

The Committee adopted the report on the consideration of the President's Memorandum on the Parliamentary Pensions (Amendment) Bill (N.A. Bill No. 45 of 2019) having been proposed and seconded by Hon. Jimmy Angwenyi, MGH, MP and Hon. Edith Nyenze, MP respectively.

## REFERRAL BY H.E. THE PRESIDENT OF THE PARLIAMENTARY PENSIONS (AMENDMENT) BILL, 2019

#### Honourable Members,

You may recall that on 5<sup>th</sup> August, 2020, the National Assembly passed the Parliamentary Pensions (Amendment) Bill (National Assembly Bill No. 45 of 2019). The Bill was sponsored by the Leader of the Minority Party, the Hon. John Mbadi, MP. Following its passage, I did present the Bill for Assent to H.E. the President in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution and our Standing Orders. However, in exercise of the powers conferred under Article 115(1)(b) of the Constitution, H.E. the President, by way of a Memorandum dated 7<sup>th</sup> September, 2020, has since referred the Bill back to the National Assembly for reconsideration.

**Honourable Members,** in his Memorandum, H.E. the President has expressed reservations on Clause 2 of the Bill which sought to amend section 8 of the Parliamentary Pensions Act (Cap. 196) to provide for an entitlement for former Members of Parliament who served between 1<sup>st</sup> July, 1984 and 1<sup>st</sup> January, 2001 to a monthly pension of one hundred thousand shillings.

Amongst the reasons for his reservations, H.E. the President notes the following-

- (i) Members' pensions under the Act are calculated according to the contributions paid into the Scheme during their parliamentary term. The proposed amendment fails to provide for such calculation, and makes no reference to the Members' contributions;
- (ii) The Bill overlooks the mandate of the Salaries and Remuneration Commission under the Constitution, which comprises, among other things, the setting and review of remuneration and benefits for all State officers, who include Members of Parliament; and,
- (iii) The proposed pension payment will result in an annual cost implication of about four hundred and forty-four million shillings. Added to this, will be the almost certain demand for similar upward review of pension benefits by other retired State and public officers, which is within their rights to demand. The resultant ripple effect is unaffordable and fiscally unsustainable.

Consequently, H.E. the President recommends deletion of the said Clause of the Bill, which as a matter of fact, is the primary content of the Bill.

Honourable Members, Standing Order 154(2) requires the House to consider the President's Reservations within twenty one (21) days upon receipt of the Memorandum. In this regard, the Reservations of the President, as contained in his Memorandum, now stand committed to the Departmental Committee on Finance and National Planning for consideration, which should table its report soonest to allow the House to consider the President's Reservations within the said timelines.

Honourable Members, may I, at this point, remind the House of the Speaker's Communication of July 28, 2015 concerning the consideration of the President's reservations to a Bill and amendments thereto. I particularly draw your attention to my guidance, that the voting threshold for the passage of amendments proposed by a Committee or an individual Member that have the effect of fully accommodating the President's reservations is a simple majority as contemplated under Article 122(1) of the Constitution as read together with Article 115(2)(a).

On the other hand, an amendment that **does not fully accommodate** the President's reservations, or indeed one that has the effect of a total override of the President's reservations, including negating his proposed text, would require a **two-thirds voting** threshold to be passed in keeping with the provisions of Article 115(4) of the Constitution.

**Honourable Members,** I therefore direct the Clerk to circulate the memorandum from H.E. the President to all Members so that they familiarize themselves with its contents.

# REFUSAL TO ASSENT TO THE PARLIAMENTARY PENSIONS (AMENDMENT) BILL, 2020

#### **MEMORANDUM**

By His Excellency the Honourable Uhuru Kenyatta, President and Commander-in-Chief of the Kenya Defence Forces.

Submitted to the Speaker of the National Assembly.

WHEREAS a Bill entitled "A Bill for An Act of Parliament to amend the Parliamentary Pensions Act", the short title of which is "The Parliamentary Pensions (Amendment) Bill, 2020" was passed by the National Assembly on the 5<sup>th</sup> August, 2020;

AND WHEREAS the Parliamentary Pensions (Amendment) Bill, 2020, was presented to me for assent in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution, on the 4<sup>th</sup> September, 2020;



NOW THEREFORE, in exercise of the powers conferred on me by Article 115 (1) (b) of the Constitution, I refer back the Parliamentary Pensions (Amendment) Bill, 2020, for reconsideration by the National Assembly for the reasons set out hereunder:

#### CLAUSE 2

Clause 2 of the Bill seeks to amend section 8 of the Act by inserting the following new subsection—

(3) Notwithstanding subsection (2), a former Member of Parliament who, having served in Parliament between 1st July, 1984 and 1st January, 2001 and is entitled to pension under this section and whose monthly pension amounts to less than one hundred thousand shillings shall be entitled to a monthly pension of one hundred thousand shillings.



Members' pensions under the Act are calculated according to the contributions paid into the Scheme during their parliamentary term. The proposed amendment does not provide for such calculation, and makes no reference to the Members' contributions. It is therefore, not clear as to the source of the additional monthly payment.

In addition, the Bill overlooks the mandate of the Salaries and Remuneration Commission under the Constitution, which comprises, among other things, the setting and review of remuneration and benefits for all State officers, who include Members of Parliament.

The proposed pension payment will result in an annual cost implication of four hundred and forty-four million shillings. Added to this will be the almost certain demand for similar upward review of pension benefits by other retired State and public officers, which is within their rights to demand. The resultant ripple effect is unaffordable and fiscally unsustainable.



#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

For the foregoing reasons, I recommend that clause 2 of the Bill be deleted.
