8*. <u>PROCEDURAL MOTION</u>- <u>EXEMPTION OF BUSINESS FROM A</u> <u>RESOLUTION OF THE HOUSE</u>

(The Leader of the Majority Party)

THAT, this House orders that the business appearing in the Order Paper as Order Nos. 10, 11, 12, 13 and 14 be exempted from the Resolution of the House of November 3, 2020 regarding *prioritization of Business during the period November 3 to December 3, 2020*, being a Thursday Morning, a day allocated for Business not sponsored by the Majority or Minority Party or Business sponsored by a Committee.

9*. <u>MOTION</u> – <u>ESTABLISHMENT OF DATABASE CENTRES IN</u> <u>ALL CIVIL REGISTRATION CENTRES IN THE</u> <u>COUNTRY</u> (The Hare Mark Women MD)

(The Hon. Mary Wamaua, M.P.)

THAT, aware that the Constitution and the Kenya Citizenship and Immigration Act, 2011 provide that every citizen is entitled to any document of registration or identification issued by the State to citizens including a birth certificate; further aware that, Article 53(2) of the Constitution of Kenya provides that a child's best interests are of paramount importance in every matter concerning the child; cognizant of the fact that, issuance of birth certificates during civil registration associated with children is a challenge across the country due to among other issues, missing information for the parents and children as a result missing and improper documentations, damaged manual documents, and lack of registration of children born outside hospital environments;

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deeply concerned over the delays and long queues at civil registration centres and the challenges affecting registration of children by the Ministry of Education using the National Education Management Information System (NEMIS) in the Country; **this House urges** the Government to establish database centres in all Civil Registration Centres for purposes of storing all the necessary information required for issuance of birth certificates to all children and puts in place administrative mechanisms to ensure that every child is automatically issued with a birth certificate before the child attains the age of three years.

14*. <u>MOTION</u> – <u>APPROVAL OF THE ACCESSION TO THE AFRICAN</u> <u>CHARTER ON DEMOCRACY, ELECTIONS AND</u> <u>GOVERNANCE</u>

THAT, this House **adopts** the Report of the Departmental Committee on Defence and Foreign Relations on its consideration of the Accession to the African Charter on Democracy, Elections and Governance, *laid on the Table of the House on Tuesday, November 17, 2020,* and pursuant to the provisions of section 8(4) of the Treaty Making and Ratification Act, 2012 **approves** *the Accession to the African Charter on Democracy, Elections and Governance by the Republic of Kenya.*

15*. <u>MOTION</u> – <u>PROVISION OF ASSISTIVE DEVICES AND REQUIRED</u> <u>MEDICAL ITEMS FREE OF CHARGE TO PERSONS</u> <u>WITH DISABILITIES</u>

(The Hon. Dennitah Ghati, M.P.)

THAT, aware that according to the World Health Organization, an estimated 15 percent of the world's population live with some form of disability or different ability, with 80 percent of them living in developing countries; further aware that in Kenya, approximately 6.5 million people live with some form of disability out of whom, nearly 3.8 million are women and girls, while approximately 85 percent of the total number live in abject poverty; concerned that a majority of Persons with Disabilities (PWDs) face numerous challenges including being denied their fundamental rights and freedoms including the right to education and opportunities to work, virtually guaranteeing that they will live their lives in poverty which often exacerbates their vulnerability and dependency on other people, assistive devices and critical medical items and requirements; deeply concerned that lack of these devices, medical items and requirements makes it impossible for PWDs to live normal and dignified lives;

this House **urges** the National Government to provide assistive devices and required medical items and requirements free of charge to Persons with Disabilities at the Constituency level through government hospitals or any other government body and to put in place mechanisms for replacement of worn-out devices to enable them live a dignified life, be more productive and to coexist with other people in the society.

16*. <u>MOTION</u> – <u>CONTINUATION OF THE *KAZI MTAANI*</u> <u>PROGRAMME</u>

(The Hon. Mishi Mboko, M.P.)

THAT, aware that the National Hygiene Programme (NHP), dubbed Kazi Mtaani, is a national initiative that was designed to cushion the most vulnerable but able-bodied citizens living in informal settlements from the effects and response strategies of the COVID-19 pandemic; acknowledging that the first phase of the programme started in April 2020 covering eight counties employing over 26,000 workers, while the second phase which began in July 2020 was expanded to cover 34 counties employing over 200,000 workers and is expected to run for six and a half months; appreciating that the programme continues to gradually achieve most of its objectives which include, amongst others, provision of economic empowerment to the youth, prioritization of labour-intensive approaches to Extended Public Works Projects (EPWPs) and utilization of local suppliers while giving preference to locally manufactured goods and services; cognizant of the fact that the programme has greatly assisted in the reduction of social vices that arise as a result of poverty and idleness such as drug abuse and emergence of criminal gangs; concerned that the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic are still prevalent and the country will take a long time for the economy to restabilize; this House therefore resolves that the National Government rolls out subsequent phases of the Kazi Mtaani Programme to cover all the 47 counties to address youth unemployment and further cushion the vulnerable members of society, and reviews the current remuneration of the workers in accordance with the Wage Order of 2018.

17*. <u>MOTION</u> – <u>DEVELOPMENT OF A NATIONAL POLICY AND</u> <u>CRITERIA FOR THE IDENTIFICATION OF</u> <u>ECONOMICALLY MARGINALISED ZONES</u> (The Hon. (Dr.) Gideon Ochanda, MP)

THAT, aware that Article 203(g)(h)(i) & (j) of the Constitution of Kenya safeguards the rights for the marginalized communities and ensures equitable distribution of resources to address affirmative action regarding distribution of resources; concerned that various government agencies and departments use different modes, parameters, indicators and definitions to marginalization, arid and semi-arid lands, hardship areas, poverty and poverty pockets to place mitigating preferential and affirmative resources; further concerned that many areas that qualify and at times are worse off than the traditionally acclaimed marginalized zones do not benefit from the affirmative action government resources, **this House resolves** that the Government through the State Department for National Planning to urgently develop a common national policy and criteria that shows hardship indicators, marginalization progression and clear parameters for use by all government agencies and departments as well as county governments in directing preferential and affirmative action resources.

18*. <u>MOTION</u>- <u>EMPOWERMENT OF ARTISANS BY THE</u> <u>GOVERNMENT</u>

(The Hon. John Kiarie, M.P.)

THAT, aware that there are diverse talents amongst the youth; noting that these talents have been severally displayed through various inventions and innovations showcased by the artisans in platforms such as the Annual Youth Innovation Week and other profiled on social media; concerned, that most of these innovations and artworks do not go beyond making sensational stories in their localities, local dailies and social media mentions; further noting that most of these innovations and artworks are crucial in ideas promotion, intellectual development, creating employment and addressing the problems that affect us as Kenyans on a daily basis; concerned that there is inadequate support and administrative measures in place by the Government to support the artisans; cognizant of the fact that the Kenya Vision 2030 seeks to make our country an industrialized middle-income economy; aware of the immense potential for wealth creation and job opportunities that our own local production can generate if well-developed and commercialized; recognizing that while our imports are well in excess of Kshs.2 billion and are largely composed of non-value adding consumer goods; noting that homegrown technology would be region sensitive and appropriate for the environment, social economic dynamics and suitable for our utility; further concerned that most artisans lack appropriate technological, skills, capital and tools; this House resolves that the National Government through the relevant Ministry formulates a policy which stipulates that at least two per cent (2%) of the National Government Constituencies Fund and Uwezo Fund shall be set aside and allocated for the purposes of equipping artisans with the necessary skills, tools and appropriate technology.

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19*. MOTION INSTITUTIONALISATION OF RAINWATER HARVESTING AND STORAGE

(The Hon. Halima Mucheke, M.P.)

THAT, aware that Article 43(1)(d) of the Constitution provides for the right to clean and safe water in adequate quantities for every person; further aware that up to 30 percent of Kenyans rely on unimproved water sources, such as ponds, shallow wells and rivers, whereas nearly 45 percent of Kenyans lack access to basic sanitation solutions; noting that proper water management is vital for sustainable development in light of threats to water availability such as climate change, rapid population growth and industrialization; further noting that studies have indicated that the country's rainwater potential is more than 350 billion cubic meters, and that, if harvested, this water can support up to five times the country's population; concerned that only 9 out of 55 public water service providers in the country provide continuous water supply to connected areas; appreciating that over time, rainwater harvesting has been proposed as a possible means to address the water crisis in the country; this House resolves that the Government institutionalizes rainwater harvesting and storage in all buildings as a standard requirement and further that all road constructions by the national government shall henceforth incorporate storm water collection and storage for non-potable use.

I. THE TEA BILL (SENATE BILL NO.36 OF 2018)

Notice is given that the Chairperson of the Departmental Committee on Agriculture and Livestock intends to move the following amendments to the Tea Bill (Senate Bill No. 36 of 2018) at the Committee Stage, subject to recommital—

NEW CLAUSE

THAT, the Bill be amended by inserting the following new clause immediately after clause 32—

(2) It shall be a defence to a charge under this section where the court is satisfied that—

- (a) the act or omission constituting the offence took place without the person's knowledge; or
- (b) the person took reasonable steps to prevent the commission of the offence.
