<u>The House resolved on Wednesday, February 10, 2021 as follows</u>-<u>Limitation of Debate on Bills sponsored by Parties or Committees</u>

I. THAT, each speech in a debate on Bills sponsored by a Committee, the Leader of the Majority Party or the Leader of the Minority Party shall be limited as follows:- A maximum of forty five (45) minutes for the Mover, in moving and fifteen minutes (15) in replying, a maximum of thirty (30) minutes for the Chairperson of the relevant Committee (if the Bill is not sponsored by the relevant Committee), and a maximum of ten (10) minutes for any other Member speaking, except the Leader of the Majority Party and the Leader of the Minority Party, who shall be limited to a maximum of fifteen Minutes (15) each (if the Bill is not sponsored by either of them); and that priority in speaking shall be accorded to the Leader of the Majority Party, the Leader of the Minority Party and the Chairperson of the relevant Departmental Committee, in that order.

Limitation of Debate onCommittee Reports

II. THAT, each speech in a debate on Committee Reports (except for Reports of Audit Committees), including a Report of a Joint Committee of the Houses of Parliament or any other Report submitted to the House for which limitation of time has not been specified, shall be limited as follows:- A maximum of two and a half hours, with not more than twenty (20) minutes for the Mover in moving and five (5) minutes for any other Member speaking, including the Leader of the Majority Party and the Leader of the Minority Party and the Chairperson of the relevant Committee (if the Committee Report is not moved by the Chairperson of the relevant Committee), and that ten (10) minutes before the expiry of the time, the Mover shall be called upon to reply; and further that priority in speaking shall be accorded to the Leader of the Majority Party and the Leader of the Majority Party, in that order.

<u>The House further resolved on Tuesday, March 23, 2021 as follows</u>-<u>Limitation of Debate on Bills under Article 257 of the Constitution</u>

III. THAT, pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 97(1) and notwithstanding the resolution of the House of February 10, 2021, each speech in debate on **Bills under Article 257 of the Constitution** (Amendment of the Constitution by Popular Initiative) shall be limited as follows:- a maximum of sixty (60) minutes for the Mover in moving and thirty (30) minutes in replying and a maximum of fifteen (15) minutes for any other Member speaking, except for the Leader of the Majority Party, the Leader of the Minority Party and the Chairperson of the relevant Committee (if the Bill is not moved by a Committee) who shall be limited to a maximum of thirty (30) minutes each, and that priority in speaking be accorded to the Leader of the Majority Party, the Leader of the Minority Party and Chairperson of the relevant Committee, in that order.

 - (i) Could the Cabinet Secretary provide details on the process followed by the Government with respect to the tender and award of the contract for the construction of the Lamu Port -South Sudan – Ethiopia - Transport (LAPSSET) Corridor project in Lamu County, including the international and national procurement procedures followed in the entire process?
 - (ii) Could the Cabinet Secretary provide a list of all firms and individuals who were prequalified or who tendered for LAPSSET Project?
 - (iii) Could the Cabinet Secretary also provide the names of firms and individuals who have been direct beneficiaries of employment opportunities at the project, and in particular, a list of any tenders awarded to residents of Lamu County and employment benefits, if any, to local residents of the County.
