




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CHAIRPERSON'S FOREWORD

This report contains the Committee's proceedings on the consideration of the Public Petition regarding Lack of Access to Citizen Registration Services by Residents of Garissa and Wajir Counties. The Petition dated 23rd March, 2021 by Hon. Aden Duale, MP on behalf of the residents of Garissa and Wajir Counties was presented to the National Assembly on 23rd March, 2021 and subsequently committed to the Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security for consideration and report to the House pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 227(1).

The Committee was required to respond to the Petitioner by way of a report addressed to the petitioner or petitioners and laid on the Table of the National Assembly not more than sixty (60) calendar days from the time of reading the prayer.

While considering the Petition, Hon. Aden Duale, MP and the Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Interior and Co-ordination of National Government appeared before the Committee and made submissions.

The Committee is grateful to the Offices of the Speaker and the Clerk of the National Assembly for the logistical and technical support accorded to it during the consideration of the Petition. Finally, I wish to express my appreciation to the Honourable Members of the Committee, the Committee secretariat and all the stakeholders who made submissions towards the preparation and production of this report.

On behalf of the Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security and pursuant to provisions of Standing Order 227(2), it is my pleasant privilege and honor to present to this House the report of the Committee on its consideration of the Public Petition No. 008 of 2021 regarding regarding Lack of Access to Citizen Registration Services by Residents of Garissa and Wajir Counties.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Public Petition No. 008 of 2021 dated 23rd March, 2021 regarding Lack of Access to Citizen Registration Services by Residents of Garissa and Wajir Counties was submitted to the National Assembly on 23rd March, 2021 by Hon. Aden Duale, MP on behalf of the residents of Garissa and Wajir Counties. The Petition was subsequently committed to the Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security for consideration and report to the House pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 227(1).

The Petitioners averred that despite the clear provisions of Article 1(1), 2(1) and 12 of the Constitution, many Kenyans residing in Garissa and Wajir Counties had been denied registration and identification documents which had in essence rendered them stateless.

On account of the denial of the critical registration documents, most Kenyan citizens residing in Garissa and Wajir Counties were unable to access government services including health and education services, and had further been denied their political and economic rights that include voting, access to banking services and formal employment.

Those who made submissions before the Committee on the petition were Hon. Aden Duale, MP on behalf of residents of Garissa and Wajir Counties and the Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Interior and Co-ordination of National Government. Their submissions were key in determination of the Committee's recommendations.

The Committee therefore recommends as follows-

- 1. Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Interior and Co-ordination of National Government to facilitate persons who were registered or found to have attempted to register as refugees and are Kenyan citizen to access government services awaiting government regularization of the status.
- 2. The Ministry of Interior and Co-ordination of National Government should fast truck the adoption of the report on the vetting of the double registered persons which was conducted through committees comprising of members drawn from Immigration Department, National Registration Bureau, National Government Administrative Officers and Elders and ensure regularization of the status of the persons that were vetted.

PART 1

PREFACE

1.0 ESTABLISHMENT AND MANDATE OF THE COMMITTEE

Hon. Speaker,

1.1 Mandate of the Committee

- 1. The Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security is established in accordance with the provisions of Standing Order 216 of the National Assembly. Its mandate as provided for in S.O. 216(5) is
 - (a) investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the assigned Ministries and departments;
 - (b) study the programme and policy objectives of Ministries and departments and the effectiveness of the implementation;
 - (c) study and review all legislation referred to it;
 - (d) study, assess and analyze the relative success of the Ministries and departments as measured by the results obtained as compared with their stated objectives;
 - (e) investigate and inquire into all matters relating to the assigned Ministries and departments as they may deem necessary, and as may be referred to them by the House;
 - (f) to vet and report on all appointments where the Constitution or any law requires the National Assembly to approve, except those under Standing Order 204 (Committee on Appointments);
 - (g) examine treaties, agreements and conventions;

- (h) make reports and recommendations to the House as often as possible, including recommendation of proposed legislation;
- (i) consider reports of Commissions and Independent Offices submitted to the House, pursuant to the provisions of Article 254 of the Constitution; and
- (j) examine any questions raised by Members on matters within its mandate.
- 2. The subjects under the Committee's jurisdiction are; national security, police services, home affairs, public administration, public service, prisons, management of natural disasters and community service orders.

PART 2

2.0 <u>INTRODUCTION</u>

2.1 Constitutional and Statutory provisions regarding Petitions

- 5. Standing Order 227 provides for the committal of public petitions to the House whereby every Petition presented or reported to the House shall be committed to the relevant Departmental Committee for consideration and report to the House and petitioner within sixty (60) days. Further, the Petition to Parliament (Procedure) Act, 2012 provides for the procedure to be followed in the submission, processing and consideration of a Petition.
- 6. The Public Petition No. 008 of 2021 regarding Lack of Access to Citizen Registration Services by Residents of Garissa and Wajir Counties is dated 23rd March 2021 and was presented to the National Assembly on same day by Hon. Aden Duale, MP on behalf of the residents Garissa and Wajir Counties. The Petition was subsequently committed to the Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security for consideration and report to the House and petitioners pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 227(1);
- 7. Article 12 of the Constitution provides that every citizen is entitled to the rights, privileges and benefits of citizenship that include a Kenyan passport and any document of registration or identification issued by the State to its citizens.
- 8. Articles 94 as read together with Article 95 of the Constitution further provides for the role and by extension the authority of Parliament in general and the National Assembly in particular. Generally, the Houses of Parliament exercise the legislative mandate of the people, deliberate on matters of national interest and oversight the exercise of power by other arms of government.
- 9. The right to Petition Parliament is provided for under Article 119 of the Constitution and states as follows:-

"Every person has a right to Petition Parliament to consider any matter within its authority, including enacting, amending or repealing any legislation. Parliament shall make provision for the procedure for the exercise of this right."

10. Despite efforts to have the matter resolved by the Director of Registration of Persons through the Ministry of Interior and Coordination of National Government had not borne much fruit. This culminated in a Petition to the House by Hon. Aden Duale, MP.

PART 3

3.0 HEARING ON THE PETITION

3.1 HON. ADEN DUALE, MP

- 11. Hon. Aden Duale, MP on behalf of the residents of Garissa and Wajir Counties appeared before the Committee on Wednesday 14th April, 2021 and submitted as follows-
 - (i) After nearly sixty years of Independence, many residents of Garissa and Wajir Counties still did not possess identification documents;
 - (ii) Article 1(1) and 2(1) of the Constitution provides that sovereign power belongs to the people of Kenya, and further stipulates that the Constitution is the supreme law that binds all persons and state organs at both levels of government;
 - (iii) Article 12 of the Constitution provides that every citizen is entitled to the rights and privileges and benefits of citizenship that include a Kenyan passport and any documents of registration or identification issued by the State to its citizens;

- (iv) Despite the clear provisions of Article 1(1), 2(1) and 12 of the Constitution many Kenyans residing in Garissa and Wajir Counties had been denied registration and identification documents which had in essence rendered them stateless;
- (v) Failure by the State to issue registration and identification documents to specific areas of the country amounts to fundamental denial and infringement of the fundamental human rights and freedoms guaranteed under the Bill of rights;
- (vi) On account of the denial of the critical documents, most Kenyans citizens residing in Garisa and Wajir Counties were unable to access government services including health and education services, and further been denied their political and economic rights that include voting, access to banking services and formal employment;
- (vii) Lack of registration and identification documents had been attributed to double registration where Kenyans residing in Wajir and Garissa Counties were registered in the Refugees Data Base mainly at Dadaab and Kakuma Refugees Camps in order to access services such as medical and education opportunities and who were fated to a stateless life without dignity in their own country;
- (viii) Over 11,000 Kenyan Somalis in Garissa and Wajir Counties were registered as refugees which was the only alternative they had in securing relief food occasioned by the massive drought experienced in the 1990s; and
- (ix) Efforts to have the matter resolved by the Director of Registration of Persons through the Ministry of Interior and Co-ordination of National Government had not borne much fruit as exemplified by the fact that despite verification of a few thousand youths in Garissa Township, Lagdera, Ijara, Fafi, Dadaab and Wajir South through a Government Taskforce in 2019, the youths had to-date not been de-registered as refugees which was a prerequisite for issuance of relevant identification and registration documents.

3.2 MINISTRY OF INTERIOR & COORDINATION OF NATIONAL GOVERNMENT

- 12. Dr. Fred Matiang'i, Cabinet Secretary for the Ministry of Interior and Coordination of National Government appeared before the Committee on Wednesday, 21st April, 2021 and submitted as follows
 - a) Kenya hosts a total of 515,466 refugees from Somalia, South Sudan, Democratic Republic of Congo, Ethiopia, Burundi, Sudan, Uganda, Eritrea and Rwanda;
 - b) Double registration refers to a state in which persons were registered or found to had attempted to register both as a Kenyan and as a refugee for the purposes of acquiring a national and a refugee identity cards;
 - c) the estimated number of persons in multiple registration is 40,000 according to UNHCR records, out of whom 19,272 had applied for regularization of their registration status;
 - d) the population was spread across Garissa, Turkana, Wajir, Mandera, Mombasa, Malindi, Isiolo, Nakuru, Eldoret and Nairobi counties. Some Kenyans were registered as refugees to benefit from free food, increase food rations by increasing the family size, education, resettlement to third countries and free health services, among other reasons;
 - e) Their fingerprints were captured in the Refugee database, a situation that has made it difficult for them to acquire national identity cards. On the other hand, some refugees registered as Kenyans for free movement, business and jobs opportunity, access to education outside the camps, acquire citizenship, while others wanted voting rights after being lured by local politicians, among other reasons;
 - f) The vetting of the double registered persons was conducted through committees comprising of members drawn from Immigration Department, National Registration Bureau, National Government Administrative Officers and Elders in the following sub counties: Wajir South, Habaswen, Wajir East, Buna, Garissa, Ijara and Fafi. A total of 19,272 people were vetted. However, the emergence of COVID-19 pandemic

- slowed down the adoption of the report and regularization of the status of the persons that were vetted.
- g) The Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Interior and Coordination of National Government undertook to facilitate persons who were registered or found to had attempted to register as refugees and are Kenyan citizens to access government services awaiting the regularization of their status as Kenyan citizens.

4.0 COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS

Arising from the submissions by the Petitioner and stakeholders, the Committee observed that;

- a) Based on the submissions of the Ministry of Interior and Coordination of National Government, Kenya hosts a total of 515,466 refugees from various countries including Somalia and South Sudan and the estimated number of persons in multiple registration is 40,000 according to UNHCR records, out of whom 19,272 had applied for regularization of their registration status.
- b) The double and multiple registration of refugees arose as a result of registration of some refugees spread across various counties including Garissa, Turkana, Wajir and Mandera as Kenyans for ease of free movement, business and jobs opportunities, access to education, acquisition of citizenship and voting rights among other reasons.
- c) The double and multiple registration has hindered Kenyans whose details appear in the Refugees data base from being registered and issued with identification documents including national identity cards.
- d) That the lack of registration and identification documents have hindered Kenyan citizens from accessing government services including education services, health facilities and employment opportunities among others.

e) That although the vetting of the double registered persons was conducted through committees comprising of members drawn from Immigration Department, National Registration Bureau, National Government Administrative Officers and Elders from various sub counties including Wajir South out of which 19,272 people were vetted, the exercise is yet to be concluded due to the COVID-19 Pandemic which has delayed the regularization of the status of the persons that were vetted.

5.0 COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

- 13. Arising from the observations, the Committee recommends as follows—
 - (i) THAT, the Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Interior and Coordination of National Government to expedite the vetting and registration of citizens living along the Kenyan borders to enable them access government services.
 - (ii) THAT the Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Interior and Co-ordination of National Government does expedite the adoption of the report on the vetting of the double registered persons which was conducted through committees comprising of members drawn from Immigration Department, National Registration Bureau, National Government Administrative Officers and Elders and ensure regularization of the status of the vetted persons.
 - (iii) THAT upon the conclusion of the regularization process, the Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Interior and Co-ordination of National Government does facilitate the registration of persons who have been vetted and determined to be Kenyan citizens in accordance with the requirements of the Registration of Persons Act, Cap 107.

- 9. **THAT**, over 20,000 Kenyan Somalis in Garissa and Wajir Counties are presently registered as refugees which was the only alternative they had in securing relief food occasioned by the massive drought experienced in the 1990s;
- 10. **THAT**, efforts to have the matter resolved by the Director of Registration of Persons through the Ministry of Interior and Coordination of National Government have not borne much fruit as exemplified by the fact that despite verification of a few thousand youths in Garissa Township, Lagdera, Ijara, Fafi, Dadaab and Wajir South through a Government Taskforce in 2019, the youths have to-date not been de-registered as refugees which is a prerequisite for issuance of relevant identification and registration documents;
- 11. AND THAT the matters raised in this Petition are not pending in any court of law in Kenya.

NOW THEREFORE, your humble petitioners pray that the National Assembly through the Departmental Committee on Administration and National Security:

- (i) investigates the matter with a view to recommending to the Ministry of Interior and Coordination of National Government to de-register as refugees all persons that were vetted and confirmed as citizens, to guarantee issuance of relevant identification and registration documents to all vetted persons, and to recommend for vetting and de-registration as refugees of any other persons that were left out in the vetting process, and
- (ii) makes any other recommendation that it deems fir in the circumstances of the Petition.

And your **PETITIONERS** will ever pray.
