CHAIRPERSON'S FOREWORD

The Universities (Amendment) Bill, 2023 (National Assembly Bills No.38) sponsored by Hon. Wanami Wamboka, M.P was read a First Time on 18th October, 2023 and committed to the Departmental Committee on Education for consideration and reporting to the House, pursuant to Standing Order 127(1).

The object of the Bill is to amend the Universities Act to provide a framework on the exclusive placement of government sponsored students in public universities. The Bill further seeks to remove private universities board representation in the Board of management of Kenya Universities and Colleges Central Placement Service (KUCCPS) to safeguard the Universities Fund in line with the constitutional principles of public finance.

Pursuant to Article 118(1) (b) of the Constitution and Standing Orders 127(3), adverts for request for submission were placed in the "Daily Nation" and the "Standard" newspapers on 20th October, 2023 inviting interested members of the public to submit any representations they may have on the Bill. The Committee received representations from National Association of Private Universities in Kenya (NAPUK) and the Kenya National Commission on Human Rights (KNCHR). All the submissions were considered by the Committee.

Further, in considering the Bill the Committee held a total of four (4) meetings to receive and consider submissions.

The Committee having considered the Bill clause by clause and taking into consideration views and recommendations of the stakeholders pursuant to Standing Order 127(3A) made observations and recommendations contained in section 4.0 and 5.0 of this Report.

PART I

1.0 PREFACE

1. 1 Mandate of the Committee

- 1. The Departmental Committee on Education was constituted pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order No. 216(1) of the National Assembly Standing Orders. Pursuant to the Standing Order 216 (5) read together with the Second Schedule to the Standing Orders, the functions of the Committee are to: -
 - (i) investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operations and estimates of the Ministry of Education;
 - (ii) study the programme and policy objectives of Ministry and the Departments of the Ministry, and the effectiveness of the implementation;
 - (iii) study and review all legislation referred to it;
 - (iv) study, assess and analyze the relative success of the relevant Ministry as measured by the results obtained as compared with their stated objectives and,
 - (v) investigate and inquire into all matters relating to the as may be necessary, and as may be referred to the Committee by the House;
 - (vi) to vet and report on all appointments where the Constitution or any law requires the National Assembly and by extension, the Committee to approve;
 - (vii) make reports and recommendations relating to the functions of the relevant Ministry to the House as often as possible, including recommendation of proposed legislation;
 - (viii) make recommendations to the House as often as possible, including recommendation of proposes legislation;
 - (ix) consider reports of the relevant commissions and independent offices submitted to the House pursuant to the provisions of Article 254 of the Constitution; and
 - (x) examine any questions raised by Members on a matter within the mandate of the Committee.

 - i) Education;
 - ii) Training; and
 - ii) Research.

PART II

2.0 BACKGROUND

2.1 Introduction

- 6. The introduction of the Bill was driven by concerns over the allocation of public funds to private universities, which are not governed by the same stringent regulatory frameworks as public institutions. While private universities play a role in addressing the increasing demand for higher education, critics argued that the government's financial support for these institutions was not being used effectively. Public funds were perceived as being misallocated to profit-driven private universities, leading to calls for more transparent and accountable management of taxpayer money.
- 7. Additionally, the Bill seeks to address the lack of oversight in the financial management of private universities. The provisions aim to safeguard public funds by restricting KUCCPS placements to only public universities and removing private university representation on the KUCCPS board. This move is intended to ensure that public resources are used exclusively for the benefit of public institutions, aligning with national priorities and improving accountability in the higher education sector.

2.2 Memorandum of Objects and Reasons for the Bill

- 8. The object of the Bill is to amend the Universities Act to provide a framework on the exclusive placement of government sponsored students in public universities. The Bill further seeks to remove private universities board representation in the Board of management of Kenya Universities and Colleges Central Placement Service (KUCCPS) to safeguard the Universities Fund in line with the constitutional principles of public finance.
- 9. The functions of the Sub-County Education Board shall include, the establishment of a data bank of all education and training institutions in the sub-county and assessment of the budgetary requirements of all education and training institutions in the sub-county and developing allocation programmes including programmes for allocation to institutional lunch programmes.

Statement on the delegation of legislative powers and limitation of fundamental rights and freedoms

9. The Bill does not delegate legislative powers to the Cabinet Secretary nor does it limit fundamental rights and freedoms.

Statement on how the Bill concerns county governments

10. The Bill does not affect the functions of the county governments in terms of Article 109 (5) of the Constitution as it does not contain provisions that affect the functions and powers of the county governments as set out in the Fourth Schedule to the Constitution.

11. The Universities and other institutions of higher learning are functions of the national government as provided in Part 1 of the Fourth Schedule to the Constitution.

Statement as to whether the Bill is a money Bill within the meaning of Article 114 of the Constitution

12. The enactment of the Bill shall not occasion additional expenditure of public funds.

PART III

3.0 CONSIDERATION OF THE BILL BY THE COMMITTEE

3.1 Committal of the Bill

13. The Universities (Amendment) Bill, 2023 (National Assembly Bill No. 38) sponsored by the Hon. Wanami Wamboka, MP was read a First Time on 18th October, 2023 and committed to the Departmental Committee on Education for consideration and reporting to the House, pursuant to Standing Order 127(1).

3.2 Public Participation on the Bill

- 14. Pursuant to Article 118(1) (b) of the Constitution and Standing Orders 127(3), adverts for request for submission were placed in the "Daily Nation" and the "Standard" newspapers on 20th October, 2023 inviting interested members of the public to submit any representations they may have on the Bill. (Annexure 3). The Committee received representations from National Association of Private Universities in Kenya (NAPUK) and the Kenya National Commission on Human Rights (KNHCR) which were considered by the Committee.
- 15. In considering the Bill the Committee held a total of three meetings to receive and consider submissions from the stakeholders.

3.3 Meeting with the Sponsor of the Bill

- 16. Hon. Wanami Wamboka, M.P, the sponsor of the Universities (Amendment) Bill, 2023 appeared before the Committee on 22nd October 2024 and submitted as follows:
- 17. The principal object of the bill is to provide a framework for the exclusive placement of government-sponsored students in Public Universities.
- 18. It further seeks to remove Private Universities' board representation in the Board of Management of Kenya Universities and Colleges Central Placement Service (KUCCPS) to safeguard the Universities Fund in line with the Constitutional Principles of Public finance. The implication is to remove the two Vice- chancellors representing private universities membership in the Board of KUCCPS.
- 19. The Bill also seeks to amend Section 56(1) of the Universities Act in paragraph (a) by inserting the word "public" immediately after the words "government-sponsored students to ensure that the functions of Kenya Universities and Colleges Central Placement Service are the coordination and placement of Government-sponsored students to public Universities and Colleges.
- 20. The provisions of this Act shall come into force six months after its commencement. The Kenya Universities and Colleges Central Placement Service shall, within thirty days of the Commencement of this Act, publish and publicize the changes in the placement of Government-sponsored students as established by this Act.

PART IV

4.0 COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS

- 23. Upon reviewing the Bill and the submission received, the Committee made the following observations:
 - i. The mandate of KUCCPS is not limited to placement of students in Universities. The Service also acts as a database related to University and College placement, disseminates information on available programmes in Universities and advises the Government on student placement.
 - ii. The removal of the two Board members representing private Universities would disadvantage private Universities since KUCCPS also acts as a database related to University and College placement, disseminates information on available programmes in Universities, among other functions.
- iii. Under the New Funding Model for higher education, the Kenya Universities and Colleges Central Placement Service has not placed government-sponsored students in private Universities for the last two academic years.

PART V

5.0 COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATION

The Committee, having considered the Universities (Amendment) Bill, 2023 and the submissions from stakeholders and the sponsor of the Bill, recommends that the House approves the Bill with amendments contained in the Schedule of Amendments forming part six.

PART VI

6.0 SCHEDULE OF AMENDMENTS


