## **CONSIDERATION OF THE NOMINATION OF DR. PATRICK OMWANDA AMOTH, EBS FOR APPOINTMENT TO THE POSITION OF DIRECTOR-GENERAL FOR HEALTH.**

1. The Chairperson informed the Committee that pursuant to the provisions of section 16(2) of the Health Act, (Cap. 241), the Cabinet Secretary for Health vide a letter **Ref. MOH/ADM/VOL. III/203**, dated 21<sup>st</sup> June, 2024, submitted the name of Dr. Patrick Omwanda Amoth, EBS as the successful candidate for appointment to the position of Director-General for Health members after a competitive recruitment process by the Public Service Commission;

2. Consequently, the Speaker of the National Assembly and the Speaker of the Senate on Wednesday, 26<sup>th</sup> June 2024 and Wednesday, 3<sup>rd</sup> July 2024 respectively issued a communication directing that the approval hearing for the nominee for appointment to the position of Director General for Health be conducted jointly by both Houses of Parliament as required by section 4 of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, (Cap. 7F), Standing Order 216 (5) (f) of the National Assembly Standing Orders and Standing Order 77(1) of the Senate Standing Orders.
3. The Chairperson thereafter invited the Legal Counsel to brief the Committee on the legal provisions expected to be followed during approval hearings, criteria for vetting, issues for consideration in relation to nomination of a nominee and the powers to call for evidence.
4. The Committee was informed that-
  - a. Following the Communication from the Speakers of the Houses of Parliament, the Clerk of the National Assembly and the Clerk of the Senate had invited interested members of the public to submit any representations, by written statements on oath, with supporting evidence, on the suitability of the nominee for appointment to the position of Director General for Health;
  - b. The notification was followed up with letters to the nominee inviting him to attend the vetting and requesting him to submit the completed Questionnaire set out in the Schedule to the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act together with clearance certificates from the Office of the Directorate of Public Prosecutions (ODPP) Ethics and Anti-Corruption Commission (EACC), Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA), Higher Education Loans Board (HELB), Directorate of Criminal Investigations (DCI), Office of the Registrar of Political Parties (ORPP) and any credit reference bureau.
5. The Committee was further informed that the three (3) memoranda had been received from the members of public and one Memorandum from Dr. Wahome Ngare dated 19<sup>th</sup> July 2024 was accompanied by a request to appear before the Committees before the approval hearing.

#### **Committee resolutions**

6. Following deliberations, the Committees **resolved-**
  1. to consider all memoranda received from the Members of Public despite only one memorandum having fulfilled the requirements of section 6 (9) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, (Cap. 7F) with regards to '*written statements on oath*'; and;
  2. to accede to the request by Dr. Wahome Ngare to appear before the Committees to present his memorandum on the suitability of the nominee for appointment to the position of Director-General for Health at a joint sitting of the Committees scheduled for Thursday, 10<sup>th</sup> July, 2024 at 10.00 a.m.

The Committee observed that Dr. Patrick Amoth demonstrated the requisite knowledge and experience to perform the functions of the Director-General for Health having satisfactorily performed in an acting capacity for four (4) years. He further met all legal and constitutional requirements to perform the functions of Director-General for Health.

**ON NOMINATION OF A PERSON FOR APPOINTMENT AS THE  
DIRECTOR-GENERAL FOR HEALTH**

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**Honourable Members,**


1. Pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order 42(4), I wish to report to the House that I have received a Message from the Cabinet Secretary for Health regarding the nomination of a person for appointment as the Director-General for Health.
2. In the Message, **Honourable Members**, the Cabinet Secretary conveys that, in exercise of powers conferred by Section 16 (2) of the Health Act, 2017, she nominates **Dr. Patrick Omwanda Amoth** for appointment as the Director-General for Health. The Cabinet Secretary therefore seeks the approval of Parliament on the said nomination.
3. **Honourable Members**, you may wish to note that the approval of appointment of a Director-General of Health is among one of the exceptions where the applicable law prescribes approval by the two Houses of Parliament.

4. Therefore, **Honourable Members**, just for clarity, the vetting process shall proceed in the following manner -

- (i) **THAT**, the vetting of the nominee proposed for appointment as Director-General for Health shall be conducted by the Departmental Committee on Health of the National Assembly, jointly sitting with the Committee of the Senate;
- (ii) **THAT**, the quorum of the joint sittings of the Committees will be the respective quorums of each of the committees as stipulated in the Standing Orders of the respective Houses;
- (iii) **THAT**, as contemplated under Rule 9(6) of the Joint Rules unless a decision is reached by consensus, any vote to be taken in the joint sittings of the Committees shall be by separate Houses. This will ensure that the numerical difference of the individual Members representing the Houses in the joint sittings has no effect on the decisions of the joint sittings of the Committees;
- (iv) **THAT**, the joint Committees shall, having concluded the approval hearings, submit a Joint Report to the respective Houses in the manner contemplated by Paragraph 7 of Joint Rule No. 9; and
- (v) **THAT**, the approval process shall be conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011.

- 5. Honourable Members,** whereas the Health Act does not provide specific timelines within which the House is to consider the nominee, section 8(1) of the Public Appointments (Parliamentary Approval) Act, 2011 requires the relevant House to undertake the exercise within twenty-eight (28) days. Conscious of the fact that the House is scheduled to proceed for recess this week, I hasten to clarify that the counting of days with respect to the consideration of the nominee will cease during the recess period and resume when the House first sits upon resumption. Therefore, the Departmental Committee on Health shall submit their Joint Report on or before **Tuesday, 13<sup>th</sup> August 2024** to enable the House to consider the proposed appointment.
- 6. Honourable Members,** the Committees are expected to forthwith jointly commence the approval process and notify the nominee and the general public of the time and place for holding the approval hearings and upon conclusion, table its report within statutory timelines.

Honourable Senators,

1. I have a communication to make on the nomination of a person for appointment as the Director General for Health.
2. Vide a letter, Ref. MOH/ADM/VOL III/2023, dated 21<sup>st</sup> June, 2024, my office received communication from the Cabinet Secretary, Ministry of Health submitting the name of Dr. Amoth Patrick Omwanda as the successful candidate for the position of Director General for Health, following a competitive recruitment exercise conducted by the Public Service Commission.

Honorable Senators,

3. Section 16 (2) of the Health Act, requires Parliament to vet the nominee submitted by the Cabinet Secretary for appointment as the Director General for Health. The said Section states as follows-

*"The Director-General for health shall be recruited by the Public Service Commission through a competitive process, vetted by Parliament and appointed by the Cabinet Secretary."*

# IEBC seeks top court's advice as boundaries review timelines lapse

tioned by the failure to recruit a new chair and six commissioners as the constituency boundary review timeline has kicked in without agency being properly constituted.

Marjan said that the commission faces a serious constitutional crisis over failure to undertake a review of electoral boundaries by March 2024 which Attorney General Justin Muturi has since said will have far-reaching consequences on the country's political stability, social cohesion, and integrity.

He cites that under Article 89(2) of the Constitution provides the IEBC shall review names and boundaries of constituencies at intervals of not less than eight years, and not more than 12 years. The last review was in March 2012 and the latest date for the next review was to be in March 2024, which has since lapsed.

The IEBC, which has filed the petition, has based its argument on Article 163 (6) of the Constitution which provides that: The Supreme Court

may give an advisory opinion at the request of the national government, any State organ, or any county government with respect to any matter concerning county government.

"That this court is duly clothed with jurisdiction under Article 163(6) to provide an advisory opinion on the matter which opinion may unlock the unprecedented deadlock facing the commission and I, therefore, beseech to consider the request and advice as

is prudent." Marjan said in his affidavit filed at the Apex court.

The commission seeks legal opinion on three issues including whether it can undertake the process of delimitation of electoral boundaries and other electoral processes in the absence of commissioners or the requisite quorum of commissioners.

Secondly, IEBC is seeking opinion whether it can conduct a review of the names and boundaries of constituencies and wards when the timelines envisaged under Articles 89(2) and 89(3) as read with Section 26 of the of the County Governments Act have lapsed.

Thirdly is whether the times envisaged by the constitution for delimitation of electoral boundaries, having lapsed, can be extended or otherwise excluded the time when the commissioners were not in calculating or reckoning time.

IEBC says its decision to approach the court was necessitated by the AG's real opinion dated April 22, 2024, that it had breached the constitution by failing to conduct the delimitation of boundaries within the timelines set out by the constitution.

"From a legal perspective, the failure by the Commission to undertake the delimitation of boundaries within the timelines set by the Constitution may result in legal challenges and litigation. Individuals may seek legal redress, arguing that the failure to delimit boundaries has compromised their constitutional rights to fair representation and participation

in the electoral process," the AG told the IEBC.

The chief executive adds that following the High Court decision rendered on January 24, 2024, ordering immediate recruitment of commissioners, the same has never happened to date and all functions at the commission have been brought to a halt.

He says that the vacancies in the IEBC have far-reaching consequences since the delimitation deadline has lapsed and various by-elections have since not been conducted in some counties across the country.

Marjan says that although the returning officers for Parliament and County Assemblies are not commissioners, the secretariat of IEBC cannot conduct elections or by-elections.

This is because decisions to allocate funding, procure materials, hire temporary staff (including their training), and equipment for the elections, and observation of elections, and referendum are made by commissioners.

The constitutional single six-year terms of the chairperson Wafula Chebukati, and members Boya Mulu and Abdi Yakub Guliyi, expired on January 17, 2023. The vice chairperson Juliana Cherera, and members Justus Nyang'aya and Francis Wanderi resigned in December 2022. Irene Masit was dismissed by President William Ruto on February 27, 2023 following a recommendation by a tribunal that investigated her conduct.

# Ruto spoke to IMF after dropping Bill

The Fund had foreseen the protests but advised the government to ignore them

BY MOSES NYAMORI AND MUTEMBERS

President William Ruto spoke by phone to International Monetary Fund (IMF) chief Kristalina Georgieva days after he withdrew the Finance Bill, 2024 in response to nationwide protests.

Two diplomatic sources, who sought anonymity, confirmed the phone conversation yesterday. The President chaired a 15-minute Cabinet meeting where he instructed Treasury to reorganise the budget to accommodate the Sh300 billion gap left following the withdrawal of the bill on Wednesday last week.

According to the sources, there was an agreement among key donors that the IMF needs to be flexible on programme targets. One of the sources said the government was told to show a commitment to reducing wasteful expenditure, curbing corruption and increasing accountability in exchange for the IMF flexibility.

Yesterday's Cabinet meeting is said to have discussed austerity measures, according to a minister who spoke to the *Daily Nation* in confidence.

"We have agreed to implement austerity measures and budget cuts to balance the shortfall occasioned by the withdrawal of the bill," the Cabinet Secretary said.

According to a Cabinet dispatch, there will be substantial budget cuts "to balance between what to be implemented and what can wait", and ensuring that key programmes are not affected.

"Our plan is good and solid and, in the fullness of time, we shall be vindicated," President Ruto told the meeting.

There is a general feeling that the government has an expenditure problem.

Some of the money raised and loans taken go to waste through corruption and financing extravagance.

On the day Dr Ruto dropped the bill, he proposed budget cuts in the Executive, Judiciary, Legisla-

ture as well as the devolved governments.

"I direct immediate austerity measures to reduce expenditure, starting with the Executive Office of the President and extending to the entire Executive arm of government," he said.

I direct that operational expenditure in the presidency be reduced to remove allocations for the confidential vote, reduce travel budget, hospitality and purchase of motor vehicles, renovations and other expenditure."

al a week ago is likely to result in the country missing key programme targets, though the government does not urgently need cash from the IMF after it repaid a bond that was originally worth \$2 billion by issuing a new seven-year bond this year.

The IMF has been a major target of the anger of young Kenyan protesters, who accuse it of being the driving force behind the tax-raising measures.

The global lender reached a staff level deal with the government early last month. The deal is on a policy package needed to complete the lending programme's seventh review, expected to unlock disbursement of several hundred million dollars.

The agreement has not yet received approval from the IMF Executive Board.

"We remain deeply concerned by the recent tragic events in Kenya and maintain close and constructive dialogue with the Kenyan authorities," an IMF spokesperson said.

State House spokesman Hussein Mohamed did not pick calls from the *Daily Nation*.

The reporter also sent him a text message which had not been

responded to by the time of going to press.

President Ruto has pledged to enforce austerity, but also suggested that the government would need to increase borrowing in the 2024/25 financial year.

An IMF spokesperson said last week that the main goal of the institution is to help Kenya overcome its economic challenges and improve lives.

"IMF will continue helping Kenya, but the disbursements are more likely to resume towards the end of this year," an analyst said.

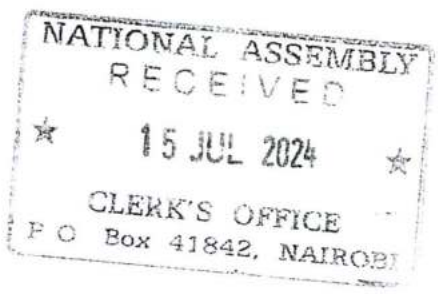

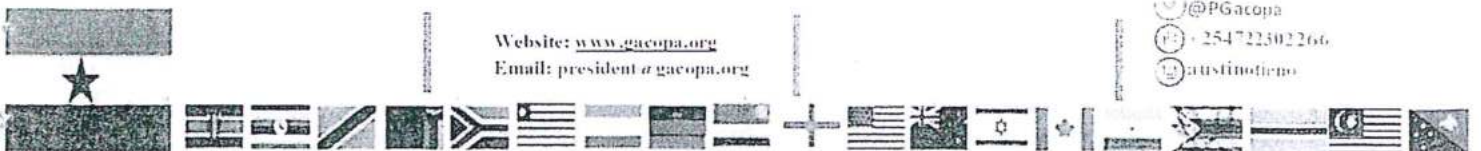

- **COVID-19 Response:** I refute claims of fear-mongering and misinformation, highlighting my reliance on technical expertise and adherence to established protocols for lockdowns, treatment recommendations, and vaccine rollout.
- **Vaccine Efficacy and Safety:** I emphasize the effectiveness of COVID-19 vaccines in reducing illness severity, hospitalization, and death, and clarify concerns regarding specific vaccine platforms and side effects.
- **Natural Immunity vs. Vaccine-Induced Immunity:** While acknowledging the role of natural immunity, I emphasize the standardized and controlled protection offered by vaccines and highlight the importance of herd immunity for protecting vulnerable populations.
- **RT-PCR Testing:** I defend the value of RT-PCR testing for diagnosing COVID-19 infections while acknowledging its limitations in distinguishing active from inactive virus.
- **Maternal Health Guidelines:** I clarify the use of the term "uterine evacuation" and emphasize adherence to legal and ethical frameworks regarding abortion.
- **Constitutional Interpretation:** I argue that legal interpretations of the Kenyan Constitution regarding abortion extend beyond a literal reading and require deeper legal analysis.
- **Malaria Control:** I defend my exploration of innovative tools like GMO mosquitoes alongside traditional methods for malaria control, emphasizing evidence-based decision-making.
- **HPV Vaccination:** I refute claims of promoting vaccine hesitancy and highlight the benefits of HPV vaccination in preventing cervical and other cancers, addressing concerns regarding safety and emphasizing informed consent.
- **WHO Collaboration:** I clarify Kenya's adherence to WHO recommendations while maintaining national sovereignty, emphasizing critical evaluation and adaptation of





WHO guidance to the Kenyan context and clarifying misconceptions regarding my role in the WHO Executive Board.

In conclusion, I present a detailed response to the allegations, defending my leadership and commitment to public health in Kenya. I emphasize my reliance on scientific evidence, adherence to ethical guidelines, and focus on protecting the health of the Kenyan population. AFFIDAVIT ON RESPONSE THERETO

I, DR. PATRICK OMWANDA AMOTH, a resident of Nairobi County within the Republic of Kenya, being a male adult of sound mind do hereby make oath and state as hereunder:

1. THAT I am a Kenya Citizen and holder of National Identification Card Number 9286112.
2. THAT I am the current Acting Director General, Health in the Republic of Kenya.
3. THAT I have received, read and understood the claims and allegations contained in the Affidavit of one Dr. Wahome Ngare sworn on the 19<sup>th</sup> July 2024 (hereinafter, Affidavit) in his opposition to my candidature and now wish to respond as hereunder.
4. THAT in response to paragraph 4 of the Affidavit, I wish to respond and state that as the current Acting Director General for Health I hold the office following a proper and procedural appointment by the Public Service Commission. This appointment



process prioritized both professional competence and suitability for the role. I continue to serve with this mandate as the Acting Director General.

- a. In accordance with the Health Act 2017 and my role as the Acting Director General for Health, I leveraged on both my technical training and the expertise of a formally appointed Ministry of Health technical committee, the COVID-19 Modelling Committee. This committee regularly advised the National Emergency Response Committee on COVID-19 on various health related aspects of the pandemic. This approach directly contradicts the allegation that fear-based messaging and misinformation regarding a lack of COVID-19 treatment options were used.
- b. Allegations regarding my dismissal of repurposed drugs for COVID-19 treatment require clarification. At the time, there was insufficient, high-quality clinical evidence to definitively support the widespread use of Ivermectin, Hydroxychloroquine, and Vitamin D for COVID-19. Following established public health protocols, I as the Acting Director General for Health prioritized the recommendation of therapies with robust scientific backing to ensure patient safety and optimal treatment outcomes. It is worth to note that clinical guidelines are constantly reviewed and updated as new evidence emerges to make them as current as possible.
- c. The allegation that lockdowns are ineffective against airborne diseases due to droplet physics is an oversimplification. While droplet size plays a role, factors like viral load and time of exposure also contribute to transmission. Lockdowns, when implemented effectively, can reduce person-to-person contact, thereby limiting transmission opportunities, regardless of the specific viral dispersal mechanism. Countries like Sweden and Tanzania, while opting for less stringent measures, did experience higher COVID-19 caseloads compared to regions with stricter lockdowns. It's important to consider the specific context and overall public health strategy when evaluating the effectiveness of lockdowns.



- d. While the full scope of Phase I and II COVID-19 vaccine trial results might not have been publicly available in March 2021, regulatory bodies like the World Health Organization and Stringent Regulatory Authorities including the US Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and the European Medicines Agency (EMA) meticulously reviewed all essential safety and efficacy data before authorizing vaccine rollout. These reviews included comprehensive analyses of interim results and ongoing monitoring. Healthcare workers and security forces were prioritized for vaccination due to their high exposure risk, aiming to protect them and indirectly reduce community transmission. Transparency in vaccine development is crucial, and ongoing efforts are being made to expedite public access to complete trial data. All COVID-19 vaccines administered in Kenya stringent regulatory authorization, as well as received Emergency Use Authorization from the Pharmacy and Poisons Board, Kenya.
- e. The allegation that COVID-19 vaccines violate the Nuremberg Code due to emergency use authorization (EUA) is misleading. The Nuremberg Code applies to research experiments, not standard public health interventions like vaccination programs. COVID-19 vaccines underwent rigorous clinical trials meeting ethical guidelines before EUA. Informed consent for EUA vaccines clearly explains the potential risks and benefits, and participation is voluntary. The World Health Organization (WHO) promotes safe and effective vaccines and wouldn't endorse products lacking proper testing. While EUAs acknowledge some unknowns, they exist because the benefits of vaccination outweigh the potential risks during a pandemic.
- f. The Kenya Catholic Doctors Association (KCDA) did previously raise concerns regarding my fitness for the Office on August 16<sup>th</sup>, 2023. A full response addressing these concerns was prepared and submitted to the Public Service Commission (PSC) as requested. *Attached and marked POA-01 is a copy of that response for ease of your reference.*





5. THAT in response to paragraph 5 of the Affidavit, I wish to respond and state that extensive analysis of COVID-19 vaccines, including those by Pfizer, has demonstrated their effectiveness in preventing serious illness, hospitalization, and death. Large-scale studies published in reputable medical journals such as 'Effectiveness of COVID-19 Vaccination Against Omicron (BA.1) and BA.2 Variants' in the New England Journal of Medicine, March 2023 and the 'Myocarditis and Pericarditis Following COVID-19 Vaccination or COVID-19 Infection' in the Journal of the American Medical Association, July 2022 found significant reductions in these outcomes among vaccinated individuals. Claims that the vaccines are ineffective or cause widespread harm are not supported by robust scientific evidence. While some rare side effects have been documented, thorough safety monitoring continues, and the benefits of vaccination far outweigh the risks for most individuals. *Attached herewith and marked POA-02a is the 'Effectiveness of vaccination against SARS-CoV-2 Omicron variant infection, symptomatic disease, and hospitalization: a systematic review and meta-analysis- September 2022, and POA-2b is the Myocarditis and Pericarditis Following COVID-19 Vaccination or COVID-19 infection. JAMA*

6. THAT in response to paragraph 6 of the Affidavit, I wish to respond that while the mRNA technology platforms share some similarities, the AstraZeneca vaccine utilizes a weakened adenovirus vector to deliver genetic material rather than solely mRNA like the Pfizer vaccine. Attributing a rise in sudden deaths solely to the AstraZeneca vaccine requires careful investigation and analysis of various factors beyond just the vaccine itself. Public health authorities continuously monitor vaccine safety data, including reports of unexpected deaths. Two recent studies published in The Lancet and The BMJ have found no causal link between the AstraZeneca vaccine and a significant increase in overall mortality rates. However, these discussions on specific vaccine safety concerns may be better suited for a dedicated public health forum with access to comprehensive data for proper evaluation. *Attached herewith and marked POA-03a is the Effectiveness and safety of SARS-CoV-2 vaccine in real-world*



*studies: a systematic review and meta-analysis. "POA-03b" is the Association of COVID-19 vaccination with risk of death: a multinational cohort study. The BMJ, April 2022.*

7. THAT in response to paragraph 7 of the Affidavit I wish to respond and state that while the characterization of the vaccine components as "artificial viruses" might be used in some simplified explanations, a more precise understanding is crucial. COVID-19 vaccines don't contain infectious viruses. They utilize either mRNA or a modified adenovirus vector to deliver genetic instructions for the spike protein, a harmless part of the virus, to human cells. These instructions trigger an immune response without causing actual infection. This mechanism differs from traditional vaccines that introduce weakened or inactivated whole viruses. Detailed discussions on specific vaccine technology like mRNA or viral vectors might be more appropriate for scientific forums with deeper dives into these complex mechanisms. *Attached herewith and marked "POA-04a" is a source "How COVID-19 Vaccines Work. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (<https://www.cdc.gov/vaccines/covid-19/index.html>)" and "POA-4b" is a source "Understanding COVID-19 Vaccines. 8. THAT in response to paragraph 8 of the Affidavit, I wish to respond and state that while the role of secretory IgA (sIgA) in mucosal immunity against respiratory infections is well-established, the effectiveness of COVID-19 vaccines shouldn't be solely judged by their ability to induce high levels of sIgA. These vaccines demonstrably reduce illness severity and hospitalization rates, even if they don't fully prevent all infections. Mucosal immunity is just one arm of the immune response, and COVID-19 vaccines effectively stimulate other mechanisms like systemic antibody and T-cell responses that contribute to protection. In-depth discussions on the intricacies of mucosal versus systemic immunity might be better addressed in a scientific forum equipped to delve into these complex immunological



concepts. Attached and marked "POA-05a" is a source "Mucosal immunity in the era of COVID-19 vaccines. *Science Immunology*, August 2021" and "POA-5b" is a source "Effectiveness of vaccination against SARS-CoV-2 Omicron variant infection, symptomatic disease, and hospitalization: a systematic review and meta-analysis".

9. THAT in response to paragraph 9, I wish to respond and state that the relative merits of natural immunity versus vaccine-induced immunity for COVID-19 are a topic of ongoing scientific discussion. While natural infection can generate an immune response, its effectiveness can vary significantly. Vaccines provide a more standardized and controlled immune response, demonstrably reducing illness severity and transmission risk compared to natural infection alone. Public health policies often encourage vaccination to achieve herd immunity, protecting not just individuals but also vulnerable populations who may not mount a strong natural response. The question of mandatory vaccination versus individual choice involves complex ethical and legal considerations that may extend beyond the scope of this suitability assessment. Attached herewith and marked "POA-06a" is a source "Protection and Waning of Natural and Hybrid Immunity to SARS-CoV-2." and "POA-06b" is a source "Effectiveness of vaccination against SARS-CoV-2 Omicron variant infection, symptomatic disease, and hospitalization: a systematic review and meta-analysis."
10. THAT in response to paragraph 10 of the Affidavit, I wish to respond and state that while vaccination significantly reduces the risk of getting infected and transmitting the virus, it doesn't completely eliminate it. People with compromised immune systems or those who don't respond well to vaccines may still be vulnerable even if surrounded by vaccinated individuals. Furthermore, high vaccination rates contribute to herd immunity, which indirectly protects those who cannot be vaccinated. Therefore, ensuring a high vaccination rate benefits the entire community, not just the vaccinated individuals. The intricacies of herd immunity and transmission dynamics might be more effectively addressed in a public health



forum focused on these complex epidemiological concepts. *Attached herewith and marked "POA-07a" is a source "Bivalent Omicron BA.1-Adapted BNT162b2 Booster in Adults Older than 55 Years- January 2023."* and *"POA-07b" is a source "SARS-CoV-2-specific immune responses and clinical outcomes after COVID-19 vaccination in patients with immune-suppressive disease."*

11. THAT in response to paragraph 11 of the Affidavit, I wish to respond and state that the concept of "herd immunity" acknowledges the interconnectedness of an epidemic. While vaccination is a crucial tool, natural immunity from prior infection plays a role as well. However, the effectiveness of natural immunity can vary significantly depending on the individual and the severity of the infection. Vaccines provide a more standardized and controlled immune response, targeting a specific antigen and demonstrably reducing illness severity and transmission risk compared to natural infection alone. The mantra "no one is safe until everyone is safe" emphasizes the importance of achieving high vaccination rates to protect those who cannot get vaccinated or have weakened immune systems. In-depth discussions on the nuances of natural immunity, versus vaccine-induced immunity, along with the complexities of herd immunity, might be more suitable for a scientific forum with expertise in immunology and epidemiology.

12. THAT in response to paragraph 12 of the Affidavit I wish to respond and state that while the intricacies of RT-PCR testing may be a subject of ongoing scientific discussion, the test remains a valuable tool for diagnosing COVID-19 infections. RT-PCR detects viral RNA, which indicates the presence of replicating virus. Distinguishing between active and inactive virus in individual cases might require additional testing, but a positive RT-PCR result is a strong indicator of current or recent infection. Asymptomatic individuals can still transmit the virus, and





identifying them through testing helps with isolation and contact tracing to curb the spread. The decision to test symptomatic or asymptomatic individuals is a public health strategy determined by factors beyond just the test's limitations. In-depth discussions on the nuances of RT-PCR testing and its role in public health measures might be more appropriate for a forum with expertise in infectious diseases and epidemiology. *Attached herewith and marked "POA-9a" is a source, "Comparing SARS-CoV-2 testing positivity rates and COVID-19 impact among different isolation strategies: a rapid systematic review and a modelling study. June 2023" and "POA-9b" is a source "Effectiveness of quarantine and isolation to reduce the spread of SARS-CoV-2: a systematic review and meta-analysis. The Lancet, August 2020."*

13. THAT in response to paragraph 13 of the Affidavit, I wish to respond and state that the allegation regarding my support for "killing unborn children" is centred around guidelines for managing maternal health complications. This is a complex and sensitive area where medical ethics, legal frameworks, and religious beliefs intersect. The specific guidelines mentioned detail procedures for "uterine evacuation" in cases of risky pregnancies. However, a deeper understanding of medical terminology is crucial. Uterine evacuation is a broad term encompassing procedures for miscarriage management, incomplete abortions, and termination of pregnancy due to medical reasons. Distinguishing between these requires context and clinical judgment. While some may interpret these guidelines as promoting elective abortion, a more nuanced discussion on maternal health risk factors and medically necessary procedures might be better suited for a dedicated bioethics forum. The response to the petitioner submitted to the PSC (mentioned in the allegation) likely addressed these specific concerns in greater detail. This may not be the most appropriate venue for a comprehensive exploration of abortion legislation and its intersection with medical practice.

14. THAT in response to paragraph 14 of the Affidavit I wish to respond and state that the allegation hinges on a specific interpretation of Article 26(4) of the Kenyan Constitution regarding abortion and the role of medical professionals. While the



Constitution uses clear language, legal interpretations can involve complexities beyond a literal reading. The concept of a "trained health professional" in this context might be further defined by existing legislation or regulations related to abortion. Furthermore, the Constitution specifies exceptions for situations where "any other written law" permits termination. Determining the precise scope of a "trained health professional's opinion" and its interaction with other legal frameworks surrounding abortion may necessitate a deeper legal analysis. (This suitability assessment focuses on my qualifications for office, and legal interpretations of the Constitution might be more effectively addressed in a judicial or equivalent setting.) *Attached herewith and marked "POA-10a" is a source "Does the Constitution Prescribe Rules for Its Own Interpretation?." and "POA-10b" is a source "Standardized Terminology. World Health Organization."*

15. THAT in response to paragraph 15 of the Affidavit, I wish to respond and state that the allegation centers around the terminology used in guidelines for managing pregnancies deemed "risky or unintended". While the Health Act Section 6(2) emphasizes the role of trained medical professionals, standardized medical terminology guides clinical practice but may not encompass all situations. Concepts like "risky pregnancy" can encompass various medical conditions. The specific guidelines might benefit from further clarification to align with established medical terminology for pregnancy complications. However, this is a technical discussion on guideline development and nuanced medical language. Determining the legal and ethical permissibility of terminating a pregnancy based on "risk" or "intent" involves complex considerations beyond pure medical definitions. A legal forum or bioethics committee might be better equipped to address the legal and ethical aspects of these terms within the framework of the Constitution 2010 and Health Act 2017. *Attached and marked "POA-11a" is a source "Standardization of Medical Terminology.
