Nominated Senator (Sen. Essy Okenyuri Nyaituga, MP) made a Statement regarding the sixteen (16) days of activism campaign against Gender Based Violence (GBV) which was observed in the country from 25<sup>th</sup> November, 2025 to 10<sup>th</sup> December, 2025 in the lead up to International Human Rights Day.

Thereupon, the Senator informed the Senate that the campaign sought to raise awareness and promote action against all forms of Gender-Based Violence (GBV). She noted that while physical and sexual violence were the most visible, other forms including economic, psychological, digital, and harmful cultural practices remained widespread yet often overlooked. She further stated that there had been a rising incidence of technology-facilitated violence, particularly targeting women in public life, including politicians, journalists, and human rights defenders.

The Senator further observed that despite the enactment of various laws to address GBV and the Government's commitment to related reforms, significant gaps persisted in the harmonization and enforcement of legal frameworks and in the recognition of femicide as a distinct offence. She emphasized that awareness efforts must be matched with concrete actions, adequate funding, and accountability measures, noting that survivors

continued to face challenges in accessing justice, especially at the county level.

In conclusion, she underscored the need for sustained national commitment to address the root causes of GBV, including entrenched social norms and misuse of technology, while promoting equitable access to digital reporting

tools. She urged that the National Government provide regular updates on progress in implementing reforms, strengthening GBV data management, and supporting counties in responding effectively to GBV cases.
